

FLORIDA VOTES SOUGHT BY 3. IN HOT FIGHT

CHICAGO, June 1.—Hearings on the claims of contesting delegations to next week's convention continued today to occupy the attention of the republican national committee.

A decision in the three-cornered fight in Florida was first on the program and next came the three-cornered contest from the District of Columbia. A special sub-committee composed of Committee men Warren, of Michigan, DuPont of Delaware, and Parsons of New York spent most of the night examining the law and the facts in the Florida case and prepared a report on the claims of the contestants and possibly a recommendation for a course of action by the committee.

The Florida case, in which the committee was called upon to decide whether there was, in legal effect, any republican party in Florida, promised in a sense to show the first indications of the candidacies of Major General Leonard Wood, Governor Frank O. Lowden and Senator Hiram Johnson.

None of the three contesting delegations is pledged, but the various members say that the first or regularly reported delegation headed by National Committeeman Benn of Tampa is favorable to General Wood; that the second delegation headed by H. L. Anderson of Jacksonville is favorable to Senator Johnson and that the third, headed by A. L. Church of Jacksonville, is favorable to the candidacy of Governor Lowden.

When the evidence was all in last night, many of the committeemen said that all three delegations seemed to be "defunct," but announced that they would depend upon the sub-committee headed by Committeeman Warren, who is acting as a legal adviser to the committee in the contests, to point a way out of the middle.

IRRIGATION BOND BID IS REJECTED

SALEM, Ore., June 1.—State Treasurer Hoff today rejected a bid of the Kithin-Schmeckel company to purchase \$78,000 state bonds at par with interest at 5 1/2 per cent and \$15 premium. The bonds were offered for sale to pay interest on bonds of irrigation districts under the law of 1919 whereby the state guarantees interest on irrigation bonds up to five years. The law requires that the state bonds be sold at par. The state will take the bonds, the purchase to be made by the industrial accident department.

HEAR PLEA RAISE EXPRESS RATES

SPOKANE, June 1.—Public service commissions of Washington, Oregon and Idaho were represented at a hearing held here today by F. H. Barclay, examiner for the interstate commerce commission on the application of the American Railway Express company for rate increases of 25 to 100 per cent. Several large private interests also were represented. Opposition to the rates was expressed by representatives of each of the state commissions. Leonard Way, rate expert of the Idaho public service commission, opened the case against the proposed increases.

ARKANSAS MUDDLE OVER DELEGATES

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 1.—The election of the eighteen delegates from Arkansas to the democratic national convention was before the state central committee here today. Election of the delegates by the committee was necessitated thru an oversight of the last session of the legislature which changed the date of the state primary from March to August. The committee is without authority to instruct the delegates, according to J. W. House, Jr., Little Rock, chairman of the committee.

\$20,000 PRIZE TO CHEVROLET ALSO TROPHIES

INDIANAPOLIS, June 1.—Gaston Chevrolet of Indianapolis, who won the 500-mile automobile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway yesterday in an Indianapolis-built car will be awarded his many trophies at a banquet to be given all the drivers by the citizens of Indianapolis tonight. Chevrolet's time of 5:40:14 is second only to the record made for the local course by Ralph DePalma in 1915. Chevrolet maintained an average speed of 88.1 miles an hour. He will receive the speedway prize of \$20,000; citizens' lap prize of \$1,300 for leading the field during the last 13 laps, at least \$5,000 of the \$15,000 to be divided among the drivers using accessories of certain automobile manufacturers, and the Wheeler-Schebler cup, the Prest-o-Lite trophy and the Strauss silver tea set.

The winner never left his wheel, went to the pits only once and that when he was in first place and only fifteen miles from the finish. He used but one set of tires. He was never worse than fourth place in the race. Three races here have been won by American cars and all were made in Indianapolis. Each time the car has been piloted by an Indianapolis boy. Ray Harroun won in 1911, Joe Dawson in 1912 and Chevrolet in 1920. Last year a fourth Indianapolis racer, Howdy Wilcox, drove a French car to first place. Five times the purple ribbon has gone to cars made in France.
