## C. OF C. REJECT AD PLAN AS 'NOT WORTHY'

An advertising proposition was submitted to the Chamber of Commerce by Mr. C. M. Searis for endorsement and upon investigation of same by a committee, it was decided that it was unworthy of support.

The proposition called for one page of advertising in both the daily and weekly papers for one issue and the same to be printed on an oiled enameled muslin which was to be placed in a frame and hung in several business places about town. Space was to be sold for from two and a half to five dollars, ranging three to four inches single column. The cost of this space depends upon the prosperity of the community and the limit which the traffic will bear.

As advertising of this character is a scheme to make money outside of the legitimate channels of advertising, it was decided by the committee that the same should not have the endorsement of the chamber.

Merchants are warned not to subscribe to advertising of this kind, unless the solicitor can show a written statement signed by the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce to the effect that the committee having such matters in charge approve of same.

## TRIBUTES PAID DEAD OF WARS IN CEMETARY

With fitting ceremonies and in pleasant weather, Medford yesterday paid its annual tribute to the heroic soldier and sailor dead. The graves were decorated in the forenoon, and the memorial exercises were held in the afternoon, following the patriotic parade. An eloquent memorial address was delivered by Rev. J. R. Sasnett.

The day's observance was under the joint auspices of the G. A. R., Women's Relief Corps and the American Legion. As last year the most touching feature of the day was when the parade ended at the Bear Creek bridge where many small school girls in white strewed flowers from the bridge over the water in tribute to the dead sailors, while Company D fired a salute.

James Wilson of the American Legion post, was marshal of the parade, in which the post of honor was held by the G. A. R., men. Company D, Fifth Oregon Infantry, led the parade and then in order marched the following: G. A. R., Women's Relief Corps, the American Legion post, the women's auxiliary of the American Legion post, the flower girls of the public schools, the boy scouts, carriages containing the Daughters of the American Revolution, the speakers of the day and others.

The stage of the Page theater was beautifully decorated with flowers and flags for the exercises and a pathetic feature was the three florally decorated vacant chairs, symbolic of the soldier and sailor dead, and the floral monument to the unknown dead.

One empty chair was for the departed members of the G. A. R., another for the departed members of the Women's Relief Corps, and the third for the soldiers and sailors of the world war, who died in foreign fields or at home.

The order of the program was as follows:

Assembly call; prayer, Rev. Myron T. Booser; reading of orders, adjutant J. B. Davis of the G. A. R. post; reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg address, by George Codding, commander of the American Legion post; reading, Mrs. E. H. McKean; tribute to the empty chair of the American Legion, Colonel H. B. Sargent; solo, Miss Adele Brault; decoration of monument to the unknown dead; reading of the roll of honor.

Judge Colvig; address, Rev. J. R. Sasnett; singing of America; benediction.

### Colonel Sargent's Tribute

In his tribute to the American Legion dead, Colonel Sargent spoke as follows:

"In the realm of the dead there sleep two score or more of Jackson county boys, soldiers and marines and sailors in the great world war. To them I wish to pay in few words a comrade's tribute. Would that I had the gift to utter in eloquent speech the deep feelings of respect and honor and love in which they are held by their comrades of the American Legion. So young! So dear! Their souls have made of earth's great war a golden memory.

"These honored dead, sons of this great republic, died for a great cause. For our liberty; for our country; for our flag; for us, the living, each made the supreme sacrifice. Their work is done. Beyond the turmoil of the world they are at rest.

"No more for them shall evening's rose unclose.

Her dawn's emblazoned panoplies be spread;

Alike, the rain's warm kiss and stabbing snows,

Unminded, fall upon each hallowed head.

"They gave their lives, with bodies bruised and broken.

Upon their country's altar they have bled;

They have left as priceless heritage a token

That Honor lives forever with the dead."

### Memorial Address of Day

The Memorial address of Rev. J. R. Sasnett was as follows:

"It is very fitting and proper that we this day forsake our regular pursuits, and pay due homage to our heroic dead. Three hundred and fifty-nine thousand men died in the Civil War as a sacrifice upon the altar of the Union. Many more of their comrades have gone the long trail since the surrender of Lee at Appomattox. Too, there are the noble women who "saved by the flag" at home.

"And with their spirits there mingle in fellowship of mutual sacrifice the spirits of those who had a rendezvous with death and fell in the recent war.

"Surely, these all had such a cause, and fought right valiantly. We lay our hands on the graves of this heroic band, scatter flowers on the water for those whom we call the "unknown dead" and gather throughout the nation to listen to fitting eulogies. But these things do not constitute their real memorial.

"The true memorial of those in whose honor we are assembled today is not in the flowers we lay upon their graves, nor in the most extended and elaborate eulogy of any orator, but in the great nation and in the liberty of the world, for which things they fought, even to the shedding of their own blood.

"A united nation—united in spirit as well as in geography—a nation made up of the greatest people on the planet; this is the real memorial to those whose lives constitute the price of the preservation of the union.

### What Brought Victory

"The preservation of the union was the objective of the Union Army. And well for the world that this objective was attained. It is more than a matter of speculation when we try to imagine what the result of a Confederate victory would have been. It is easy to see the map of the North American continent made up of a small United States of America, a Confederacy, and half a dozen Colonial possessions under the dominion of foreign powers. In all probability the South American Republic would still be only settlements under European powers, and the Island possessions under Spanish control. It was only because we were united in spirit that we were able to turn the tide in the recent World War when the destiny of the world was hanging in the balance.

"It occurs to me that the issues of the world war were not fought on the Western Front in Europe alone, but that those questions were decided 60 years ago at Appomattox and Gettysburg. So it is most fitting that the Grand Army of the Republic and the American Legion join in the exercises of this day.

"To the living members of the G. A. R. I would bring a garland while you are still with us. Let me say life of our nation since you stacked in behalf of this great assemblage that all the events of history in the arms have only served to make us more cognizant of what your sacrifice has meant to this great people.

### Tribute to the Legion

"We are too near the great World War to fully appreciate its vast benefits to mankind. History for all time will record that war as a crisis in the affairs of the whole world. It is simply not in words or power of man to portray the debt of gratitude

we owe the boys who sleep in Flander's Fields and those who came back after giving a glorious account of themselves in action over there. The finest tribute we can pay the returned-service men is to do the worthy thing in aiding them in their efforts to re-establish themselves in aiding them in their efforts to re-establish themselves in civil life. If we fail in this duty, no words of eulogy and no amount of flowers on future memorial days will atone for our sin.

"There is a practical lesson for us all in the concerns of this day. Peace no less than war has its duties. If we fail to consummate in peace what our heroic dead made possible in war, then shall we betray those who gave their lives. In their name, and in the name of the God of the righteous causes for which they died, I lay upon you the charge to carry on, until the world is indeed made safe for democracy."

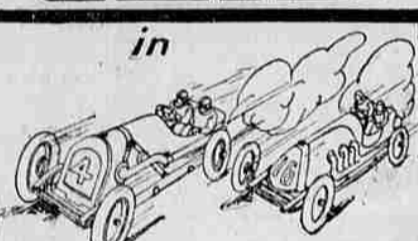
