

MOTHER OF FIRST AMERICAN SOLDIER KILLED IN FRANCE

Mrs. Alice Gresham Dodd, First War Mother of the Nation, Gives Entire Credit for Recovery of Her Health to the Well Known Medicine, Tanlac.

PAVE WAY TO HANDLE FRUIT CROP IN 1920

Definite preparations for taking care of this season's fruit crop of its members are being made by the Oregon Growers Cooperative association here. Under the guidance of Fred Mahan lately of Salem, temporary manager of the Rogue River district, the cold storage plant purchased from the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association, is being remodeled into a first class receiving, packing, storage and shipping plant.

Ground was broken this week for a new packing house to be built on land adjoining the present cold storage plant. With upwards of 250 members and 7000 acres of bearing fruit in this district, the association officials found the cold storage plant entirely inadequate. The new packing house will have a floor space of 80x100 feet. It will be a one story frame building with receiving and loading porches. Paul Wright is in charge of construction at the growers' plant.

The second story of the old cold storage plant will be used for a supply room and the entire first floor will be used for precooling and fruit storage.

Harry Stolze has been placed in charge of the supply department of the association and Clarence Pankey is in charge of packing. This week the growers' house crew is at work getting the Phoenix house of the association ready for business.

MISSOULA, Mont., May 31.—Homer P. Snyder of New York, chairman of the congressional committee inspecting Indian reservations and irrigation projects, stated here today that the Flathead project was "considered a failure," but that he and the other members of the committee were "willing to be convinced otherwise." The committee of nine members, will spend today and tomorrow on the Flathead reservation.

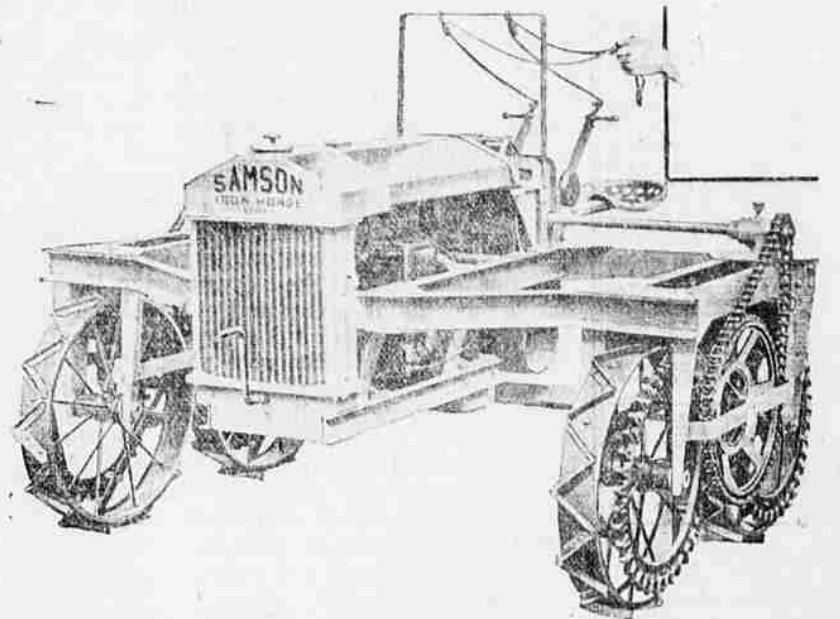
