**WOOD IN FAVOR OF SIMPLIFIED PRIMARY LAWS**

CHICAGO, June 2.—General Wood told newspapermen this morning that he had not "taken over full charge" of his campaign, as reported.

"I am here only to take charge of such matters as may require my attention," he explained. "Every department of my campaign is a law unto itself, but occasionally something crops up that requires a decision."

The general reiterated his previously expressed views on the advisability of a modification of the primary system in political campaigns. He argued for a national primary day, open expense accounts and perhaps some system of state controlled publicity that could be open to bona fide candidates at a reasonable cost.

In connection with this last proposal he referred to the South Dakota system whereby for a comparatively small fee a candidate may, through the state government, send his photograph and a limited sized circular to each voter in the commonwealth.

General Wood asked his interviewers for their views on the effect of the senatorial investigation of campaign expenditures and agreed with them that that would probably give the public some needed information as to the very considerable expense required for even a modest campaign.

**FINE CLOTHIER \$55,000, REGRET NO JAIL CELL**

SYRACUSE, N. Y., June 2.—The John A. Roberts corporation, one of Utica dealers in wearing apparel, was today fined \$55,000 by Federal Judge Harland B. Howe, following its conviction of profiteering on eleven counts.

In imposing the fine the heaviest the law would permit, Judge Howe said:

"I believe that convicted profiteers should be sent to jail. That would do more than anything else to impress the merchants who are doing business that they must confine themselves to fair and reasonable profits."

"But the defendant being a corporation in this case there can be no prison sentence. I believe it is plainly the duty of the court to impose the maximum sentence which is \$55,000 on each count or a total of \$55,000 and such is the sentence of this court."

**FIRST BLOOD TO JOHNSON, WINS DOZEN VOTES**

CHICAGO, June 2.—In its first decision affecting the Johnson forces in the convention the republican national committee by 36 to 12, voted to send delegates from the tenth Minnesota district, who are counted as favorable to the candidacy of the California senator.

Another headquarters was added to the first when Marvin A. Riley, of Trenton, N. J., opened offices in behalf of the candidacy of Nicholas Murray Butler, of New York.

Mr. Riley said the Butler managers were certain of having eighty of the 88 New York votes and he added that after the third ballot, votes would come to the Butler column from numerous other states.

The Ohio situation cleared up this morning when after a meeting of Harry Daugherty, campaign manager for Senator Harding of Ohio, and Rudolph K. Hynick, national committeeman from Ohio, it was announced at Harding headquarters that there would be complete cooperation among the Ohio delegation for Senator Harding.

**HIGH PRICE OF SUGAR DUE TO ILLEGAL ACTS**

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The sugar investigating committee in a majority report presented to the house today declared that "Attorney General Palmer had used his power as chief prosecuting officer of the government for the purpose of fixing maximum selling prices of sugar in Louisiana and in so doing acted wholly without authority of law and in violation of his own construction of his official duty."

The report, prepared by Representative Husted, republican, New York, as chairman, charged that the legislative method adopted by the attorney general was "wholly ineffective as a means of price control," and that "it gave apparent governmental sanction to extremely high sugar prices, which excited the cupidity of Cuban producers and caused an advance in the Cuban market."

**BODIES OF BOYS MISSING FOUND IN WILLAMETTE**

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2.—The bodies of Mario and Frank Casale, 11 and 7 years of age, respectively, were taken from the Willamette river here today, solving a mystery of their disappearance from their home last night and unfolding a tale, according to footprints, of a desperate attempt on the part of the older boy to save his little brother. The smaller youth, barefooted, apparently

fell into the river, and the older brother, footprints indicated, had made every effort to drag him to land but his feet slipped in the soft mud, and he too, went under. The boys left home early yesterday evening on a bicycle, the small one riding on the handlebars. It is assumed the small boy fell from the bicycle the spot where the bodies were recovered being unusually slippery.

**PROVIDE SALE OF AMERICAN SHIPS**

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Sale of American ships to foreign interests if after diligent effort the shipping board has been unable to dispose of them to Americans, is provided for in the merchant marine bill as finally agreed upon by senate and house conferees after virtually an all-night session.

Under the agreement senate provisions providing for a permanent shipping board of seven members were retained, but the senate amendment authorizing the board to set aside annually for the next five years \$50,000,000 from proceeds of charters and sales for construction of new ships was modified so as to provide for a reserve fund of only \$25,000,000 annually.

**WHEAT STANDARDS TO BE MAINTAINED**

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Continuation of present federal wheat standards was decided upon today by Secretary Meredith in an opinion covering hearings held to inquire into dissatisfaction in the central northwest with existing grades for hard red spring and durum wheats. Requests for lowering the present standards, the secretary announced would tend to decrease the return to farmers while advocates of the change argued that the producer would receive more money for his wheat. The federal standards established in 1917 and revised in 1918 have been operative only under fixed price and war conditions, the secretary stated, adding that opportunity for fair tests of their merits or defects has not been afforded under normal marketing conditions.

**ANOTHER VICTIM TO BLUEBEARD**

CALGARY, Alberta, June 2.—Dan McDonald today identified the photograph of James P. Watson, alleged polygamist, now serving a life sentence in San Quentin, California, penitentiary, as that of the man who married his former housekeeper, Mrs. Eleanor Fisher, in Seattle, two years ago, since when no trace of her has been found. Mrs. Fisher was employed by McDonald in his hotel at Okotoks, Alberta, he said. McDonald readily identified the photograph of Watson at the Calgary police station.

DOVER, Del., June 2.—The Delaware legislature adjourned sine die at 3:30 p. m. today without ratifying the Susan B. Anthony federal suffrage amendment. There was a test vote shortly before adjournment when Representative Lyons, majority floor leader, attempted to force the house into committee of the whole to consider the suffrage ratification resolution. Mr. Lyons' motion was lost by 24 votes to 10.


