In 1898 Mrs. Worlow came to Fort Klamath, Ore., and until the time of her demise had made her home with her daughter, Mrs. James Gordon. She is deeply mourned by many as her loving and helpful spirit made her beloved by all who knew her.

Funeral services were rendered by Rev. Cookingham at the Methodist church of Fort Klamath at 2 o'clock, May 26 and interment was made at the Fort Klamath cemetery.

PRUETT—Mrs. T. A. Pruett died May 31, 1920, at San Francisco hospital San Francisco after a short illness. She was born in Springfield, Mo., December 10, 1862. ## ARMY RECRUITING OFFICER HERE

Captain B. A. Yancey of the 35th Infantry at Camp Lewis, Wash., is here for a few days on recruiting duty for the 35th Infantry.

Camp Lewis is twenty miles from Tacoma. During the war Camp Lewis was occupied by the 21st and 13th divisions. There is a great deal of amusement and social life provided for the soldiers of the camp—literary, Liberty theatre, Red Cross Hostess house, service clubs and the Non-Commissioned Officers' club. A dance is held every week at the Red Cross Hostess house for all soldiers of the camp. The Non-Commissioned Officers' club also has weekly dances. Camp Lewis maintains a large vocational school where soldiers are taught all krammar school and high school subjects, such as arithmetic, algebra, geometry and Spanish. Business courses are also taught which include typewriting, shorthand and bookkeeping. The most popular course, however, at the vocational schools is the automobile and motor truck mechanics' course. This course develops a soldier into a trained repairman and automobile mechanic. These schools are maintained free by the government for all men of the camp. The 35th Infantry is accepting men for one or three years enlistments. A man enlisting for one year can learn a trade, and return to civil life, prepared to earn more money than when he entered the army.
