Every seat in the annex dining room was occupied and the highly interesting talk by Colonel Robert A. Miller of Portland upon the development of community spirit was enjoyed by all.

C., Mr. Cheesman being a representative of the United States Chamber of Commerce, Mr. and Mrs. Robt. A. Miller of Portland and Mrs. Conroy and Jerry Jerome of Medford.

During the five minutes allotted to members to bring up any subject of immediate importance, Mr. E. W. Walker presented the gasoline situation as being of utmost importance for immediate attention so that the important industries of southern Oregon may not suffer.

The following recommendation was made by the Forum to the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce: That some action be taken immediately toward an investigation of the gasoline shortage so that the essential industries of southern Oregon may not suffer.

In response to the following telegram Adjutant Elmer Wilson was authorized to subscribe a sum of money on behalf of Medford post to the American Legion Weekly fund which is being raised as a reward for the capture of Grover C. Bergdoll, the wealthy slacker and draft evader, who recently escaped from federal officers.

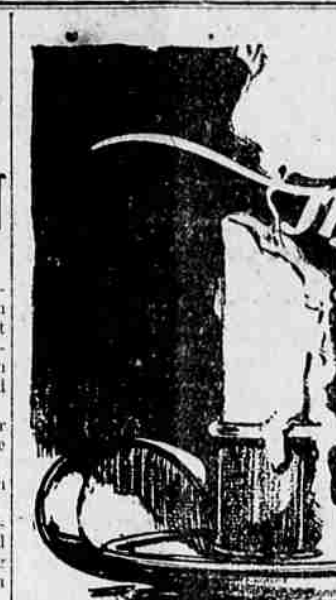

Governor Almada said the Mexican people "have confidence in the new order which means that those who are tired of war and destitute from lack of food and clothes are ready and anxious to return to work."
