The schedule includes a business session, parade, first section, banquet and second section. Banqueters are urged to be at the dining tables promptly on time, 6:30 p. m.

FORGED ORDERS TO GET BOND BOOZE

PITTSBURG, June 4.—More than 500,000 gallons of whiskey have been withdrawn from bonded warehouses in the Pittsburgh district since January 16 with bogus and forged permits, according to an announcement by W. H. Hindman, federal prohibition agent for Pennsylvania.

FIX PLANKS IN G. O. P. PLATFORM FOR APPROVAL

CHICAGO, June 4.—With the arrival today of Ogden L. Mills, chairman of the republican executive committee, on policies and platform, final conferences on the articles of the republican platform are expected to begin. The results of the work of Mr. Mills' committee are to be turned over to the resolutions committee chosen at the convention, with H. Hays, chairman of the national committee said as the function of the Mills committee is purely advisory.

"The nineteen sub-committees have been at work for six months and thru the returns of more than 100,000 questionnaires and by other means has obtained the views of more than a million republicans in every field of public activity and interest," Mr. Hays said.

"Full public hearings before the resolutions committee, will, however, be held on all pertinent questions and interested parties will be given an opportunity to present their views." "C. S. Barrett, president and other representatives of the Farmers National union, representatives of the American Federation of Labor, and Harriet Taylor Upton of the League of Women Voters, will be given adequate time."

OBREGON RETIRES MEXICAN ARMY

MEXICO CITY, June 3.—General Alvaro Obregon, commander of revolutionary forces during the revolt which ousted Carranza from power, has retired from the army, according to the Excelsior. Press dispatches say General Manuel Diguez, former governor of Guadaluajara, who was arrested during the revolution, has been freed upon orders from Provisional President Adolfo De La Huerta. General Jacinto B. Trevino, has been named secretary of industry.

THANKS JURY FOR CONVICTING MATE

TACOMA, June 4.—Mrs. Alice Wallace today personally thanked the twelve jurors who found her husband, Walter Wallace, guilty of assault with intent to kill. Wallace was charged with attempting to slay his wife with a knife. He pleaded insanity. The couple was separated at the time of the crime. Mrs. Wallace testified she would have been slain if her small son had not obtained the help of a neighbor.

FARMERS FIRST IN GASOLINE SUPPLY

TACOMA, June 3.—Governor Louis E. Hart announced today that he has arranged with oil companies to place on the preferred list for gasoline farmers of the state using the liquid for spraying, operation of irrigation pumps and similar uses. The governor said that a supply ample to meet the need of the agricultural interests is assured.
