LAST RITES TO COL. MIMS BY ELKS TOMORROW

The late Colonel George P. Mims, postmaster of Medford, will be given a public funeral in the Elks temple tomorrow afternoon. This fact was decided on the arrival here last night of Miss Margaret Mims of Spokane and George Mims of Portland, son and daughter of the dead man. All efforts to locate another son, Percy Mims who is somewhere on the sea coast, have so far been unavailing. The remains will be expressed on Saturday evening's train to Newport, Tenn., Colonel Mims' old home, for burial.

The funeral services of Saturday afternoon will be conducted by the Elks lodge of which the deceased was a member and the public is invited to attend. The body will lie in state in the Elks temple from two until 2:30 o'clock. The Elks funeral ritual will be observed, and Rev. Wm. B. Hamilton, chaplain of the lodge, will deliver the eulogy.

The pall bearers will be the following: John S. Orth, Ed Wilkinson, J. E. Barkdoll, William Budze, W. O. Webster and Jonas Wold.

The honorary pall bearers will be all the postmasters of Jackson county.

HAWAIIAN SUGAR COMING FAST

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—With in the week ending tomorrow ships of the Matson Navigation company have brought 41,100 tons of sugar to this port from the Hawaiian islands, officials of the company estimated today. Approximately 1,000,000 bags from all sources have been discharged here in the last week, it was announced. This included shipments from Java and the Philippines.

BERGDOLL, RICH SLACKER FLEES MEXICAN LINE

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 4.—Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, wealthy draft evader, who escaped from the custody of two non-commissioned officers of the army at his home in Philadelphia, May 21 is reported trying to reach the Mexican border, motoring with a companion and chauffeur, according to a message received by local department of justice officials today from San Antonio, Texas.

All peace officers in seven counties of Arizona were at once furnished with descriptions of the car and its occupants and instructed to watch for them. The San Antonio dispatch indicated the party had passed there and was heading toward Arizona presumably with the intention of driving across the international boundary into Mexico. In Texas the Rio Grande would force Bergdoll, if he wished to take his car into Mexico, to seek bridges or fords which would subject him to federal inspection.

NEW YORK, June 4.—Dr. Chadlian, a member of the Armenian delegation to the peace conference, has succeeded Alexander L. Khatisian as prime minister of the Armenian republic, according to a cable message received here today at the headquarters of the Near East relief.

HIRAM TICKLED BY LOOKS OF HIS CHANCES

CHICAGO, June 4.—Senator Johnson announced, in his daily talk with newspaper representatives he would make "a straight out fight in the open, with no trades, no deals, no compromises."

"I'm tickled to death with the situation," said Senator Johnson. "I have a feeling of confidence that is delightful to me."

The League of Nations, Senator Johnson stated, is in other hands but will be presented to the convention resolutions committee. He said it would declare absolutely against the present league covenant. The present covenant, he stated would have to be "redrafted entirely" to meet his acceptance.

Senator Johnson said he had heard rumors that efforts were being made to wean away delegates pledged to him under state primaries. He deplored any such effort and said he did not believe his adversaries were engaged in such practices. Delegations who do not follow primary instructions, he said, would be guilty of "dishonor and breach of faith," to their states.

"I expect instructed delegates," he said, "to remain with me until, beyond peradventure of a doubt, I'm out of the fight and that would mean substantially until I should release them."

LUMBER SITUATION DOUBLY PRESSED

SEATTLE, June 4.—The lumber industry of Washington and Oregon is being crippled by the shortage of cars, freight congestion automatically reducing production, says the weekly bulletin of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, issued today.

The statement adds that shipping conditions apparently are "going from bad to worse."

"From all producing regions there are reports of discontinuance of night operations," the bulletin says. "During the last month mills of the West Coast Lumbermen's association produced more lumber and shipped relatively less than any other producing region in the United States or Canada."
