MAKE UP PLAN LOCAL SCHOOLS IS ANNOUNCED

Superintendent Davenport and the board of education have announced the following plan for make-up work in the Medford public schools:

1. Pupils that have failed in three or more branches should not attempt to make up the work; it is far better to take the same over during the regular session.

2. A special permit for any make-up work will be secured through the office of the city superintendent, based upon the actual investigation of the records and statements by regular instructors and principals, which will determine in a great measure whether or not a permit should be granted.

3. Make-up work will be pursued under the direct instruction and supervision of instructors designated by the city superintendent for this work.

4. The duration of time as to such instruction will be determined by the city superintendent in conjunction with the instructor when designated; the course of study and outlines to be followed will be those of the schools for the past year; the expense incurred by such instruction will be borne by the individuals attempting such make-up work as agreed to by the instructor and parent or pupil.

5. The instructor will be asked to file an estimate and recommendation of pupils for the final test in accordance with conditions as outlined.

6. The examination or final test will be given by the city superintendent before the session begins in September. Such tests will be given between the first and tenth of September.

7. All manuscripts will be graded under the supervision of city superintendent; the decision as to results will be regarded as final.

8. The pupil that barely makes the so-called passing grade will not be given an opportunity to attempt the work of the next grade in said subject; it is conservatively believed that he should secure a standing of at least eighty per cent.

9. The office hours will be from 9 a. m. to 12 m. at the high school building, Monday and Tuesday, June 7 and 8 to consider requests for make-up work in accordance with the foregoing conditions. Pupils and parents are cordially invited to call at this time.
