STATE CHAMBER DRIVE MEMBERS STARTS JUNE 14

With practically every community in Oregon organized the intensive canvass through the state in the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce expansion movement will begin June 14th. The canvass will continue until August 1st.

The educational work in connection with the expansion movement, which began several weeks ago, will continue during June and July.

Twelve men, composing six teams of two men each, will direct the intensive organization work simultaneously in six different sections of the state. They will be assisted by eighty community executive committees appointed during the state-wide survey conducted preliminary to the intensive organization work.

Leading men in every section of Oregon are affiliated with the state chamber in the capacity of committee chairmen and members in the movement to raise a budget of \$450,000 (\$150,000 a year) covering a three year period with which to carry on the development work of the state chamber. More than two hundred endorsements have been received from these men approving the expansion movement and citing the need for such an agency as the state chamber to take the initiative in development problems affecting the entire state.

Of the total sum to be raised, \$150,000 (\$50,000 a year) covering a three year period will be raised in Portland the week of June 6th. The Portland canvass will be made June 9th, 10th and 11th. The remainder of the budget totaling \$270,000 (\$90,000 a year) covering a three year period will be raised in the thirty-six counties outside of Portland.

JACK DEMPSEY TO FACE 2 COUNTS DRAFT EVASION

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—The draft evasion charges against William Harrison (Jack) Dempsey, heavyweight champion boxer of the world, and Jack Kearns, his manager, were filed here in the United States district court. The statute covering them carries a maximum sentence of three years and a \$2000 fine in Dempsey's case in the event of a conviction. There are two charges resting against him, one actual draft evasion and the other conspiracy to effect such evasion. The Kearns case is covered only by the latter charge.

On the direct evasion charge Dempsey can be given one and on the conspiracy charge two years and a \$2000 fine.

The indictments were returned February 27 following statements made to the federal grand jury by Maxine Wayne Dempsey, divorced wife of the pugilist, that he sought her sworn testimony as to her dependence on him in order to avoid military service, and had given such testimony against her will. Subsequently she retracted her charges in a signed affidavit submitted to the United States district attorney's office here, but despite such retraction the grand jury returned the indictments.

Salt Lake City, Utah. Following the divorce Mrs. Dempsey was employed in a dance hall in Wells, Nevada, and made her charges from that place. Dempsey was charged with having falsely sworn that his father, mother, widowed sister and her two children were dependent upon him and that he had contributed \$20 a month each to their support during 1917 and that he had lived with his wife for 18 months before being called up before the draft board.

Kearns' part was alleged to have been the coaching of Dempsey in his supposed act of draft evasion. Both denied emphatically that they sought such evasion and introduced statements from draft board officials to substantiate their claims.
