

### FARM BUREAU SPECIAL MEET THURSDAY 2 P.M.

The rapid development of the Farm Bureau Co-operative Exchange has necessitated the calling of a special meeting at the public library at 2 p. m., Thursday, June 10.

Since the last regular meeting in January the business has grown from where one man was doing all the work, until at the present time six people are required to take care of the business. The directors have purchased a large warehouse with ample space. In addition to handling livestock the exchange now handles spray materials, feeds, chickens, hides, veal, dressed hogs, eggs and carries a full line of high grade stock and hay salt. This business expansion makes the exchange one of the largest business establishments in Medford, and if the members take the interest in its affairs that is required to handle a business of its magnitude, the exchange should become a great controlling factor in the agricultural development of the county.

### CAN'T REGULATE ROOSTER'S CROW

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 9.—The rooster's early morning crow cannot be restrained by court order. Such was the decision of Judge W. W. Hardwell, in district court here, after hearing a petition from Dr. C. F. Dight, a former alderman of this city, seeking an injunction to restrain sleep-disturbing noises which, he said, came from his neighbor's house and yard.

### PACIFIC ISLES IN CONTINUOUS SHAKE

PAPEETE, Tahiti, June 9.—Earthquakes which have shaken the islands of Tahiti, Moorea and Mehetia without more, than a week or two intervals since the autumn of 1918, still continue and have increased in frequency and strength. Of late there have been on an average of two or three a day, usually in the early hours before dawn. A recent but unconfirmed report affirms that the island of Taonui, about 400 miles to the South of Tahiti, is also shaking. This, it is said, would tend to confirm the theory that the source of the disturbance is a submarine outbreak somewhere to the south and west, in that part of the Pacific where surface indications would never be seen.

### WORD 'BOOZE' IS ANCIENT NAME

CLEVELAND, O., June 9.—"Booze" has had its ancient and honorable ancestry in the English language uncovered here recently by Prof. William H. Hulme of Western Reserve university.

Labeled for generations as an etymological outlaw and branded as such with quotation marks, Prof. Hulme finds "boozie" has a pedigree longer than that of most kings. Its earliest spelling, according to Prof. Hulme, was "bouse." Later writings show it was "bouse" and finally "booze."

"Both as a noun and verb the word," Prof. Hulme said, "written 'bouse' in middle English literature as far back as 1309, had the meaning 'to drink in excess.' About 1600 the word lost the honorable character it had and became a slang word. The particular 'bousing' is recorded as early as 1529, and 'bouser' was used in English in 1611."

### DOG'S CHARACTER SAVE HIS LIFE

OMAHA, Neb., June 9.—Character witness testimony in behalf of a dog was taken here recently before Judge Estelle in district court. City attorneys objected to the admission of such evidence but the judge ruled a dog has as much right to it as a human.

The good character of the dog, which had bitten a girl, was thereupon established to the satisfaction of the court and he annulled the death sentence which had previously been passed upon the prisoner.

"Dick" belonged to 12 year old Mary Schwartz. One day he ran along to the grocery store with her brother and while there bit Lena Chisno, a miss of 13. The police judge who first heard the case meted out the extreme penalty. He did not however pass on the extenuating circumstances. Some youngster in the store had stepped on Dick's tail.

### 11 DEAD, 21 HURT, REAR END CRASH, IGNORE SIGNAL

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., June 9.—Eleven persons were killed and 21 injured today when a train of express cars crashed into the rear end of a passenger train which had stopped about two miles from Schenectady because of engine trouble.

All but one of those killed were asleep in two Pullmans at the rear of the passenger train. The body of Martin Doyle of Albany, engineer of the express was found in the wreckage with one hand fast to the throttle.

A Michigan Central special carrying ten cars of express matter disregarded signals and went at high speed into a New York Central passenger train, bound from Buffalo to New York, according to the story of C. Robinson, brakeman of the passenger train. He said he waved a red lantern in vain and finally threw it into the cab as the express dashed by. The Pullman at the rear of the train had twelve passengers and was demolished.

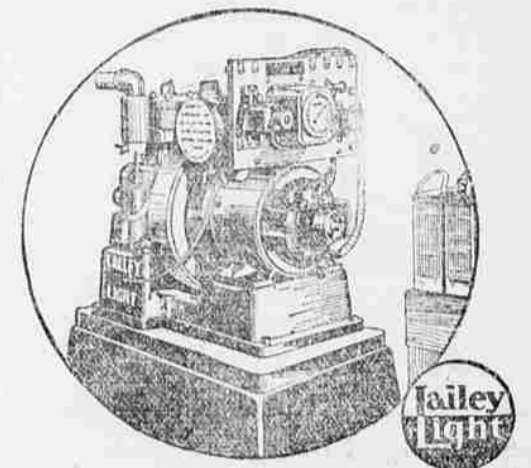
