Representative Haugen of Iowa, chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, has been a very busy man this session of Congress. His committee held many hearings on the agricultural appropriations bill and gave the measure careful consideration. When it finally passed the House the committee had succeeded in reducing the supplementary estimates \$7,132,823 and also cutting the bill \$11,558,294 below the estimates submitted by the bureau of the Agricultural Department. The decrease compared with previous appropriations is \$3,359,727.

MAKE AMERICA SAFE TO SHOP AD MEN'S PLEA

INDIANAPOLIS, June 9.—"We should strive to make America known as a safe place in which to shop," declared Richard H. Lee, New York, special counsel of the Associated Advertising Clubs, at the sixteenth annual convention of the association here today.

Through the medium of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the world, foreign nations have come to know America as the land of truth-in-advertising. Very shortly better business bureaus will be established in South America, Australia and Great Britain. Through these bureaus we may keep an accurate check on the conduct of American merchants and, when that conduct is not in keeping with work which American business is supporting in this country, we shall bring the matter to the attention of the American public that they may mark the man.

CUMMINGS VICTOR IOWA PRIMARY

DES MOINES, Ia., June 9.—United States Senator Albert B. Cummings was renominated on the republican ticket at the Iowa primary election Monday, according to unofficial returns tabulated by the Des Moines Capital. Cummings' vote was 107,843 and S. W. Brookhart's, 86,449, in 2,218 precincts out of 2,247 in the state.

Indications today were that four of the state office nominees would have to be named by the state republican nomination. For governor 2100 precincts gave Moore 54,216; Kendall, 53,923; Hayner, 41,082 and Deen, 39,914.

Storage Batteries Require a "Drink" Frequently

"Storage batteries should be inspected at least twice a month to determine whether the electrolyte is above the plates." M. B. Walker of Auto Electric Equipment Co., U.S.I. Service Station, representative for this section, stated yesterday in urging motorists to educate themselves in the care of their batteries. "It may be necessary to examine often to make sure that the plates are covered particularly in hot weather, since heat expedites the evaporation of the water.

The greatest care must be exercised in making this inspection," he continued. "If it is necessary to use a light, use an electric lamp, but under no circumstances use a match or a candle or any other open flame. The battery contains gases which on coming in contact with an open flame, may cause a serious explosion.

"Water will evaporate from the electrolyte during the normal course of battery operation. The acid itself does not evaporate. The surface of the fluid should be not less than half an inch above the plate tops. If less, enough distilled water should be added to bring it up to the required level. Well water, spring water, faucet water or water from an ordinary stream never should be used as they contain impurities which will damage the battery.

"If there is no distilled water at hand from clear rain water, if in the country, or melted artificial ice may be utilized. For this purpose, handle the water or ice only in glass, glazed or hard rubber vessels. City rain water is to be avoided because it is impure, often containing ammonia and other gases which the rain absorbs in falling.

"Whether the battery contains the up-to-date machine-pasted plates, or the old style hand-pasted plates, sulphation will set in immediately if the electrolyte is permitted to remain for any length of time below the plate tops."
