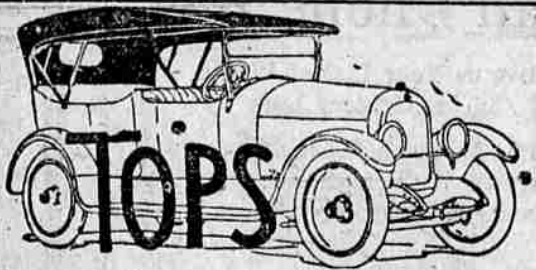

CHRISTMAS GIFTS

LEADERS OF FORUM

At the forum yesterday, being the nearest one to Christmas, the decorations of the tables were in conformity with the holiday season. The chairman, W. E. Crews, in behalf of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, presented a box of candy to Miss Vroman, who has been officiating at the piano for the community singing for a considerable time without remuneration. An Eversharp pencil was presented to Rev. D. E. Millard, who has been rendering a most appreciative service to the Chamber as song leader.

Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural college gave a very interesting analysis of the relationship of the agricultural college to the rest of the state at the members forum of the Medford Chamber of Commerce yesterday. In several instances he cited where by the expenditure of several thousand dollars, production was made possible, thru the efforts of the extension service, of millions of dollars worth of farm products upon land which had been producing practically nothing.

The Oregon Agricultural college has an enrollment of three thousand four hundred students, is the second largest institution of its kind in the United States, the one in the state of Iowa being the only larger one. Every county and practically every community in the state is represented there in the student body. There are students from fourteen foreign nations and from twenty-two other states of the union. Of the states, California furnishes the largest number outside of Oregon and the state of Washington comes next in line.

Wealth of Wonderful Scenery Shown in New Picture of God's Country at Rialto.

There is a wealth of wonderful scenery of the snow wastes of the frozen northland in the picture, "The River's End," by James Oliver Curwood, a Marshall Neilan production, that is showing at the Rialto theatre this week.

The snow scenes were taken far up in Canada, where the snows lay many feet deep on the ground almost the year round. There are miles and miles of snow fields, stretching to the horizon and beyond to the land of the midnight sun.

Here there is only a chance white man's hut, some one seeking a refuge from the world of men, an outcast from his own people. Occasionally there will be the rude tents of the northern Indians, and perhaps the igloos of the Esquimaux. But mostly it is a dreary waste, where the wolf pack hunts or howls at the moon.

In a long, long time there is seen a trail, and a white man on snow shoes traveling across the snow, or perhaps a sled drawn by huskies, white men on some unusual mission.

In this setting is laid a story of tremendous action and of deep heart interest, the story of a man driven into exile because charged with murder, of a thrilling chase which lasts for months—the relentless Royal Mounted Police on the trail, determined that justice shall be satisfied by a hanging.

Then back to civilization runs the story, following the outlaw in a dead man's garments and with a dead man's name. These mysteries and thrills are unfolded in a way that will both startle and fascinate all.

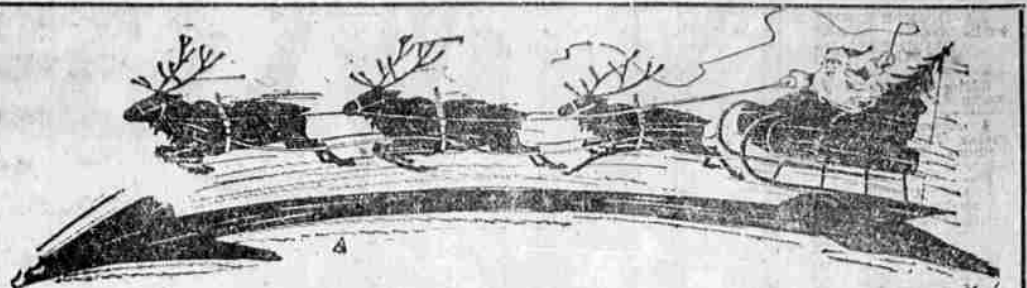
At the Page

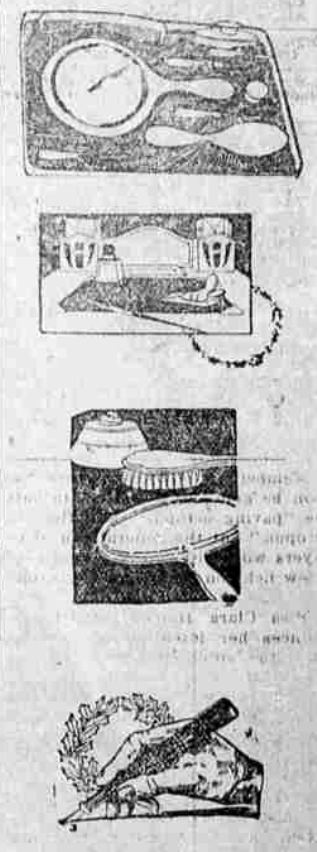
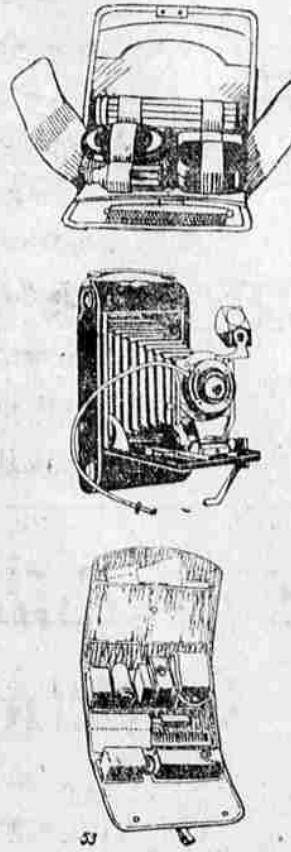
