HOLLAND FEARS INVASION BY BELGIAN ARMY

AMSTERDAM, Dec.—Opposition to the reduction of the Dutch army has revived here because of fears that a Belgian invasion may result from failure of the two governments to reach an agreement in the long-standing boundary dispute under the treaty of 1839.

At a recent meeting of the society "Our Army," which includes most of the Dutch officers, men high in command of the Holland forces, spoke strongly against a reduction of the army. One of them, Staff Captain Van Grounau, declared that a diminished army could not resist a Belgian invasion three months.
