ARMY DESERTER AUTO THIEVES ARE BOUND OVER

The four self-confessed deserters from the army and navy who were caught with a stolen automobile recently at Gold Hill and had since been held in the county jail were arraigned before United States Commissioner F. Roy Davis yesterday afternoon, where they waived examination and were bound over to the federal grand jury under \$1000 bail each, were taken to Portland last night by United States Deputy Marshals R. D. Carter and S. F. Pace.

It is understood that one of the prisoners takes upon himself all of the responsibility of the theft of the Hummobile car, and claims that his comrades did not know it had been stolen until they had reached Gold Hill.

The car was stolen from William Carpenter, 511 Valley street, Seattle, recently. The accused young men are Clarence Holmes, Harold Burdick, Herbert Ward and Richard Haas. Federal warrants charging each with the theft of an automobile in interstate commerce in violation of the national motor vehicle act were issued Tuesday evening by United States Commissioner Fraser at Portland.

The stolen car after the arrest at Gold Hill was placed by Sheriff Terrell in the custody of the Valley Garage in this city, and word was sent by him to the insurance company office in Portland of its recovery and for the company to come and get it. Shortly afterwards Tom Word, agent of the department of justice arrived here from Portland and warned the sheriff not to give the car over into the custody of any one without explicit instructions from him.

Several days ago Mr. McAllister of the insurance company arrived here to get the car, which the sheriff refused to turn over to him in the absence of any word from Mr. Word. However, U. S. Commissioner Davis called up the United States attorney's office at Portland this morning by long distance phone, and Assistant Lusk of that office gave permission for the car to be turned over to the insurance company.

It seems that the department of justice will from now on prosecute all interstate auto thieves under the federal motor vehicle act, which provides a more severe penitentiary punishment, and already its agents are gathering evidence against Earl Dawson who came here with a stolen Stevens car from Washington, and after starting it stole Bert Thierolf's car and went in it to Salt Lake. He later was arrested at Prosser, Wn., and confessed.

W. F. DE WITT HELD ON \$1000 BOND

W. F. DeWitt, the Ashland taxi driver whose machine crashed into and killed Mrs. Nona Jennings of this city Christmas eve on the Pacific highway was held under \$1000 bonds for appearance for preliminary hearing by Justice of the Peace D. W. Bagshaw of Jacksonville Wednesday afternoon. DeWitt furnished bail and appeared of his own accord when he heard a warrant had been issued. The preliminary hearing will be held early in January, probably before Justice of the Peace Glenn Taylor of this city, and under the direction of Prosecutor Rawles Moore.

INCREASE IN SALARY OF COUNTY NURSE DENIED

At the meeting of the county court this morning, a request was filed by citizens favoring an increase in the salary of the county nurse, which was not granted. The court went over the budget, and made a few minor changes. There were about 50 people from various sections of the county in attendance. The court continued its sessions this afternoon, and was expected to take up the matter of the county fair site.

FARMER'S COURSE IN MEDFORD WILL INTEREST WOMEN

The Farmers' Short Course to be held at the Medford public library January 3rd to 8th will be of interest to the women over the county as well as to the men. The program which will interest the women is as follows:

Monday, January 3rd in the forenoon, 10 to 11:30, Miss Margaret Moorhouse of the Oregon Agricultural college faculty will talk to the women on house furnishing. And in the afternoon from 1 to 2:30 on camouflage of dress, which will include points on line, color and design in home dressmaking.

The whole of Tuesday's program will be of interest to the women. This day will be given to poultry and home conveniences. In one of the morning hours, Miss Emma Weld of O. A. C. will give a talk on home arrangements to save steps and work. In the afternoon she will give an hour or more to time and labor savers and conveniences.

Wednesday, the day will be given to canning equipment and meat and fish canning, as well as to the making of the home made fireless cooker. On Thursday, at 3 p. m. Mr. A. E. Brandt of O. A. C. will give a talk on water systems and heating and lighting for the farm home. A moving picture will be given after this talk.

On Friday forenoon, Miss Lassie Lane will give talks on diet of nursing and expectant mothers. And in the afternoon on weaning the baby, diet of child up to tenth year.

Saturday will be the annual Farm Bureau meeting and every Farm Bureau woman as well as Farm Bureau man should attend this meeting. Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, state home demonstration leader from O. A. C., will give a talk on this day.

LOCAL Y. M. C. A. HAS \$175 LEFT FOR SERVICE MEN

Advices from the state office of the Y. M. C. A. indicate that there is still about \$175 remaining of the Jackson county quota of the Free Educational Fund for Ex-Service Men. This is the last of Jackson county's portion of the \$27,275 returned to Oregon from the unspent funds of the War Work council. The council released four and a quarter million dollars to be used in the United States for educational purposes for ex-service men. This has, in most cases, taken the form of scholarships. The money was distributed to states and subsequently to counties in proportion to their population. With Oregon's sum, 452 ex-service men have been granted scholarships in colleges, Y. M. C. A. schools, other vocational schools and home study courses. Some of the courses are valued at \$150 and include tools and books. With the \$25 per month granted by the state to any soldier attending school, the plan is offering most unusual advantages to our ex-service men.

Any soldier wishing to avail himself of the offer should apply at once to the Y. M. C. A. office, Liberty building, or to Cash Wood, county secretary.

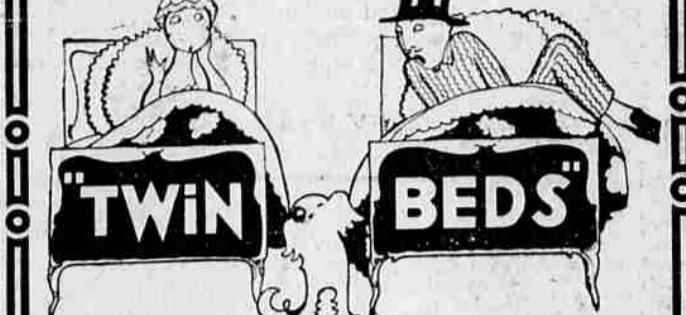

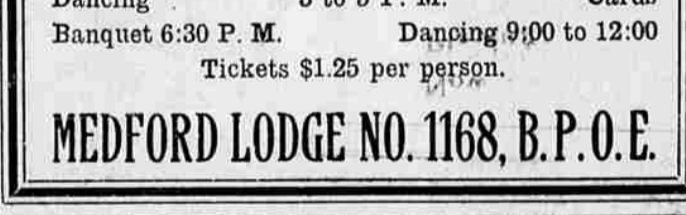
