MEDFORD'S BANK DEPOSITS, 1920 SHOW BIG GAIN

Medford banks show an increase of \$12,658.62 over 1919 for the period ending November 15, 1920. This is an increase of approximately a third of a million dollars. As bank deposits are the unfailing barometers of community prosperity, this is a bright star despite pessimistic outlooks. A presidential year, the H. C. of L., and the readjustment period.

The total deposits of the four local banks on November 15, 1920, were \$2,829,748.78. On November 17, 1919, they were \$2,517,189.96. According to the state bank examiner's report Medford is eighth among thirty Oregon cities having bank deposits of over a million dollars.

The three banks of Ashland show a total deposit of \$1,873,334.15, and Ashland is twenty-first among the banks of the state with over a million dollars deposits.

The banks at Klamath Falls, Ashland, Grants Pass, Roseburg and Medford all show an increase in deposits, and indicates that southern Oregon is the most conservatively prosperous section of the state.

ASHLAND W. C. T. U. ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR THE NEW YEAR

ASHLAND, Dec. 31.—In outlining work for the New Year, the local unit of the Woman's Christian Temperance union will meet at the city library, next Tuesday, Jan. 4. There are a group of activities to consider, notable among them, as an initial one, being an "Americanization Center," such as we find established in the larger cities, home teaching in the household being the basis of the plan. Foreign speaking citizenship is visited personally, the families being coached in the English language, and as a further result the children are rapidly being Americanized in the public schools. In this practical, effective way, the W. C. T. U. is a leading contributing factor. One does not have to go to the large eastern and central western centers exclusively, to find the foreign element among which to work, as Pacific coast localities furnish their full quotas in this respect.

Then there are nearly a dozen regional conferences to be taken into consideration, to be held for the purpose of advancing intensified activities along the lines of child welfare, citizenship, scientific temperance instruction, etc. The nation at large will be represented in these conferences, one at Boise, Idaho, and another at Seattle, Wash., being the nearest points to our local territory. "Law enforcement," as applied to the deliberations of these assemblies. The department of "Social Morality" is also receiving specific attention, it furnishing a fertile field for work among young people, it being the general policy of the organization to inculcate the desirability of adopting preventive measures in this respect rather than combating evil tendencies after the same have become firmly established. At the Frances E. Willard school, located at Belen, New Mexico, this phase of work will supply both vocational and academic training for dependent girls.

Evanston, Illinois, is the head center of the union's bureau of publicity, with Anna Gordon as president and Bertha Bowman, secretary. In southern Oregon, Mrs. Stella J. LeVitt, of Ashland, is publicity chairman, her territory including the counties of Jackson, Curry, Lake, Crook and Harney, a wide field which requires persistent effort in disseminating information concerning the manifold activities in which the W. C. T. U. is engaged, involving constructive policies of the organization and methods employed in inaugurating them thru channels which afford the most efficient service.
