## FEAR HOLLAND WILL SHUT OUT U. S. OIL MEN

THE HAGUE, Jan.—United States authorities here fear that American interests will be excluded from the great Djambal oil fields in the Dutch East Indies if a bill introduced in the Dutch parliament is adopted. The measure proposes to give the concession to these fields to a subsidiary of the Batavia Oil company. The territory to be included in the concession is described as the most valuable petroleum ground in the Dutch East Indies.

The field has long been the scene of commercial rivalry between Dutch English and American oil groups. Americans here say that the only way in which American interests could obtain representation there would be for the Dutch government to permit them to subscribe to the stock of the proposed handling company to be formed to handle the concession.

In this holding company, the Dutch East Indian government and the Batavia company would, by provisions of the bill, be joint stockholders, the government sharing largely in the profits. The government, however, will have a majority on the board of directors.

According to the Amsterdam Handelsblad, the preferred shares, giving a right to vote as to the control, but not as to the direct management, which will be in the hands of the Batavia company, will be mostly under government control, but in order to placate foreign, particularly American interests, a certain proportion of what are known as the "B" shares may be sold to foreigners with the consent of the government.

A recent dispatch stated that the parliament of the Dutch East Indies had under consideration a motion opposing the granting by the Dutch government of an exclusive concession to the Djambal oil fields without the consent of the people of the colony.

## CO. TREASURER'S BOND IS RAISED

County officers elected at the November election were sworn into office this morning at Jacksonville, constituting three changes in the personnel of the official county family. They were Prosecutor Rawles Moore, the only democrat to win in Jackson county, succeeding George M. Roberts, A. C. Walker, treasurer, to succeed Myrtle Blakeley, and Victor Bursell, county commissioner succeeding T. H. Simpson. They assumed office at once.

The bonds of County Treasurer Walker were placed and furnished at \$50,000 an increase of \$30,000 over the bonds furnished by his predecessor. This was a precautionary measure taken by the county court, and attributable to the Bank of Jacksonville failure.

Millner and Mrs. Ada Stannard, who were quietly married at the home of the bride at 1089 Boulevard, Thursday evening at 8 o'clock by Dr. C. E. Edwards. Mr. and Mrs. Millner have been residents of Ashland for the past ten years. Mr. Millner is a retired business man formerly from Iowa where he still has large interests. He also has ranches in the Bellevue district. He is one of the directors of the Citizens bank. Mrs. Millner is one of the most successful teachers of the valley. She taught in the State Training school in Minnesota and since coming to Oregon has taught in the Ashland and Talent schools, this being her seventh year in the Talent schools. They both are active in church and social circles. They expect to leave for southern California in their car in the near future to spend the remainder of the winter, where Mrs. Millner's son George is attending the university. Speaking of the pending treaty with Colombia, Secretary Colby predicted it would be ratified and maintained with propriety and justice. Action by the United States in connection with the independence of Panama, would be dealt with in the treaty, he said, as the convention will represent the frank and un concealed efforts of the United States to assuage the feelings of Colombia towards which the United States entertains the friendliest feelings.

Touching the question of exchange between the United States and Argentina Mr. Colby explained the apparent advantage in the exchange situation was really injurious to North American trade, since it reduces buying by raising prices. He said the United States was making all possible efforts to solve the problem.

## New Confidential Agent Mexican Government in Washington



Roberto V. Pesqueira has been appointed confidential agent of the Mexican Government in Washington. He succeeded Fernando Iglesias Calderon recently recalled to take his seat in the Mexican Senate according to official records. The new agent will continue the duties of Mexican financial agent in New York, which post he has held since the De la Haza regime, with those of his post here.

## ITAY WILLING TO AD AMERICA IN IMMIGRATION LAW

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—A temporary suspension of immigration pending a full investigation "with a view to passing some permanent legislation, is the real issue" before congress, Chairman Col. of the senate immigration committee, declared today at the opening of hearings on the Johnson bill restricting immigration for one year.

Representative Johnson of Washington, floor of the house measure, was the first witness. "I told the situation immediately confronting us," he said, "is such that aliens coming over in droves. They are gathering at European ports in large numbers yet reported. They represent highly undesirable class."

Mr. Johnson dealt largely with the increasing unemployment in this country. "The royal Italian government has suspended the issue of passports to subject immigrating to the United States and will refrain from issuing such passports until informed as to the classes of immigrants desired in this country," the state department has been advised by the Italian embassy.

This was fruit growers day, and the subjects discussed were along orchard culture lines. Talks were given by C. C. Coe, Prof. F. C. Reimer, Prof. Long, and Hal W. Bingham. ## NEW INSTRUMENT SHOWS STARS ARE LARGER THAN TIO'T

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—Results of the first successful experiment on an astronomical device at the Mount Wilson, Cal., observatory revealing that certain remote stars in the firmament are many thousand times larger in size than astronomer had ever surmised, was discussed today by Professor A. A. Michelson, noted scientist of the University of Chicago, who invented the device, before the American Physical society, meeting here in connection with the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Under the direction of Professor Michelson, astronomical experiments have measured the diameter of Alpha Orionis, one of the stars in the constellation of Orion. The orb is found to be 300,000,000 miles in diameter, making it 300 times as large as the sun and making the earth seem most insignificant in comparison, the sun almost a million times larger than the earth.

Professor Michelson was awarded the Nobel prize in physics three years ago. His device used in measuring the diameter of Alpha Orionis is briefly described as follows:

The mirror of an eight foot reflecting telescope is obscured by an opaque slip with two slits adjustable in width and distance apart. When the instrument is focused on a star, instead of an image of a star the appears a series of interference bands arranged at equal distances apart, and parallel to the two slits. When the slits are properly adjusted a distance is finally attained between them at which the fringes disappear. The angle of the subtended star obtained is a simple formula a when the angle and the distance between the star from the earth are known.
