INTRODUCES A BILL FOR 'SAFE' WHISKEY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—A bill designed to prevent the doctoring or adulterating of the sick man's liquor was introduced today by Representative Vare, republican, Pennsylvania. Specifically it would stop the manufacture and sale of whiskey containing less than 45 per cent of alcohol, for medicinal purposes.

Wholesale violations of the medicinal provisions of the prohibition enforcement act resulted in great harm to patients for whom liquor has been prescribed, Mr. Vare declared.
