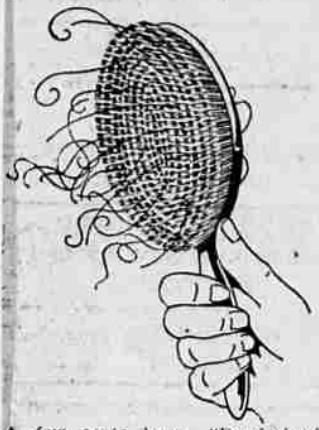

EXPECT Y. M. C. A. 'GYM' CLASS TO START IN SOON

A serious attempt is being made on the part of the business men of the city to organize a gymnasium class. This will be promoted in connection with Jackson county Y. M. C. A. activities. With the Natatorium equipment at hand, this should not be a difficult task. Most men in middle life with a penchant for the office chair and a tendency to expansion about the region of the equator, are quick to admit their need for exercise, but few can solve the problem to their satisfaction. Home methods are tedious and not too effective at best.

Gymnasium classes geared down very low to start is the real answer. Marathons will not be run the first class period and basket ball will probably not be played. Setting up exercises—the same vintage as those which made men out of so many of our soldier boys—are the thing depended on to limber creaking joints and harden flabby muscles. Volley ball, the greatest business man's game will be used largely. An experienced director is available. The aim is not to develop teams but to fit the man in middle life for his job and to add years to his life. Incidentally, it is the fun of the thing that brings them back asking for more. It is hoped to get the class started early in the year.

STRICT ECONOMY IS KEYNOTE OF DIXON'S MESSAGE

HELENA, Mont., Jan. 4.—Imperative need of the strictest economy and of additional sources of taxation was emphasized by Joseph M. Dixon yesterday inaugurated as governor of Montana in his first biennial message to the state legislature. It was delivered today at a joint session of the two houses of the assembly.

Among recommendations offered by the governor were those calling for commission government for counties; a "short ballot" form of government for the state, with an elective governor who would appoint other state officials; a state department of agriculture to replace numerous state boards and officials and a fish and game department "beyond the control of cheap, petty party politics."

Amendment of the state primary law "to require each political group to confine its activities to its own party nominations," was urged by the governor, who also declared the present legislature cumbersome and urged a reapportionment to reduce its membership. To help federal officials suppress bootlegging, he recommended a state prohibition enforcement officer and declared that in the absence of state militia, a state sheriff, with authority over all peace officers of the counties and other municipalities, was imperative.

Urging the necessity of economy, Governor Dixon declared that by March 1 next, the state will be over \$2,000,000 "in red ink," and with practically no receipts coming in until tax paying time next December," state, county, city and school district bonds and warrants, he said, on December 1 totalled more than forty-two million dollars.

Means of raising additional taxes suggested by the governor included an inheritance tax, an income tax, a tax on oil production, coal tonnage tax, a license tax for cement factories and an additional license tax on the output of metalliferous mines, revised automobile taxes and a gasoline consumption tax and increased recording and filing fees.

CAPT. BOB ROPER TO BOX BRENNAN

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—Captain Bob Roper, Chicago heavyweight, today was matched to meet Bill Brennan, Chicago, in a ten round contest in Kansas City January 17.

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—Dennis O'Keefe, Chicago welterweight will be unable to box for three months due to injuries to his hands sustained in his match with Pinkie Mitchell of Milwaukee, New Year's day. O'Keefe's left hand was seriously fractured and his right was broken. Physicians said today that a piece of O'Keefe's shin bone would be removed and grafted into his right hand.

U. S. REAR ADMIRAL ADOPTS 7 RUSSIANS

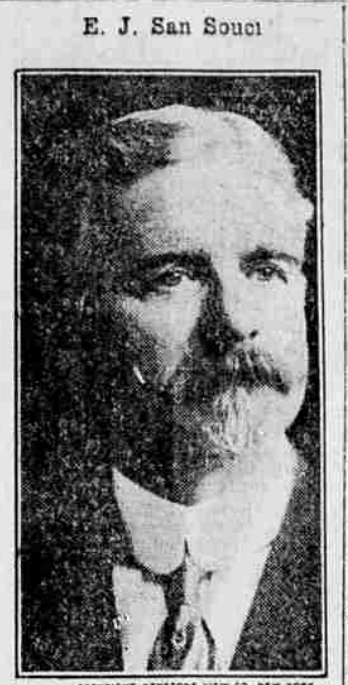
NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—Abraham J. Elkus, former ambassador to Turkey, returned today from Europe, after sitting with the Aland Islands commission of the League of Nations. Mr. Elkus did not officially represent the United States at the hearings, but simply served as a distinguished citizen of a nation that is neutral in the Aland Islands controversy. Rear Admiral Newton A. McCully, who has been serving as American high commissioner at Sebastopol, arrived here today. He brought seven Russian children whom he adopted.

'MOVIE' CRIMINAL IN CHICAGO IS BARRED

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—Motion pictures portraying criminals at work have been barred in Chicago. Chief of Police Fitzmorris announced that three weeks ago he had issued orders to the city movie censors not to issue permits for any photoplay that showed commission of a crime.

"It will make no difference whether the criminal shown is a hero or a villain," said the chief. "Even the showing of a policeman disguised as a burglar is taboo." The orders became public when three youthful robbers, who were sentenced to the reformatory said their crimes had been inspired by a "crook" moving picture.

Four Soldiers Shot.
CRACOW, Poland, Jan.—Four soldiers, found guilty of having stolen nine sacks of American flour from army stores, were shot recently.

"A Fool and His Money"

A large working staff and several members of the diplomatic corps, who will be his guests, accompanied him. The first stopping place was not announced, but it is believed the president will go to Cuernavaca and thence to Uruapan.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Jan. 4.—The Studebaker corporation will resume work on a scheduled production of ninety automobiles daily January 10, it was announced here today. The output will be increased gradually until it reaches 500 cars daily, it was said.
