

FIRE DEPARTMENT PRAISED, COUNCIL WILL TAKE ACTION

Praise for Chief Lawton and the Medford fire department for the way in which they handled the fire in the Liberty building last Sunday night was given by H. H. Pomeroy of Portland, chief deputy fire marshal of the state, this noon at the conclusion of his investigation.

As to the origin of the fire Mr. Pomeroy and Chief Lawton are of the belief that it was due to defective wiring in the basement. "There was an absence of oily rags, waste or matter of the kind," said the deputy fire marshal, "in which spontaneous combustion could have started. The house-keeping of the basement was good as basements go. There were no piles of rubbish or other refuse so often found in basements of business buildings."

"Chief Lawton used excellent judgment in his method of fighting the fire and your small department did very fine work. In fact, had the department been very much larger they could not have handled that fire any better. This is all the more remarkable in that there is nothing so difficult to handle as a basement fire, and your department was greatly deficient in suitable equipment to fight a fire of that kind. I understand the major part of this basement fire equipment was authorized by the city council and ordered some time ago, and will soon be here. Any experienced fire fighter must take off his hat to your chief and department for their splendid work of Sunday night."

It developed today that the city council will soon meet with Chief Lawton to take up the matter of getting further equipment, such as new gas masks, both for the regular firemen and for outside assistants, and portable lights to illuminate a dark, smoke laden basement.

The matter will also be taken up with owners of business buildings with basements, of cutting holes thru the first floor of such buildings, and covering them with metal covers, so that when a fire occurs in a basement, valuable time can be saved to the firemen. Instead of having to chop holes thru the first floor to get at the fire, they could just lift the covers and set the fire-fighting basement pipe apparatus through a hole into the basement.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—General commission houses selling together with lack of support led to material declines today in the wheat market. Signs pointed to slowing down of export call. Opening prices which ranged from half cent to two cents lower, with March \$1.72 to \$1.72 1/2 and May \$1.66 to \$1.67 1/2, were followed by a decided further setback.

Continued liberal receipts depressed corn. After opening 3-8c to 7-8c lower, including May at 74 3/8 to 74 1/2c, the market underwent a further sag. Oats went down grade with other cereals, starting unchanged to quarter to 3-5c off. May 49 1/4 to 49 1/2c and then weakening all around. Provisions were bearishly affected by the action of grain and hogs.

JITNEY LICENSES ARE INCREASED BY CITY COUNCIL

Beyond merely increasing the license for the interurban cars and jitneys, the city council at its first meeting of the new year last night transacted much routine business and discussed informally the strengthening of the local auto traffic laws and the fire equipment situation.

Under suspension of the rules, the motor bus and jitney license ordinance was amended so that interurban passenger carrying motor companies must pay for each car with a capacity of over 10 passengers, \$40.00 per year license instead of \$30, as heretofore, and for each car carrying up to 10 passengers \$30 a year instead of \$15 as heretofore. Each jitney must now also pay \$40 license a year instead of \$15 as formerly.

The council also discussed the matter of setting up a standard of character for each driver of a jitney or interurban car, but finally dropped the subject, as it was a very ticklish one which they did not care to tackle.

The council will let the matter rest as it has been, but took action to pay closer attention to seeing that the bondsmen for each jitney driver was gilt edged. Now, as heretofore, the city ordinance provides for the automatic revoking of the license of any jitney driver and guilty of careless driving or misconduct.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Price impairment continued during the dull noon hour. The market improved in the last hour, and especially in the copper, oil and railway groups, with General Asphalt a most prominent specialty. The closing was irregular. Speculative issues of the industrial and special varieties were under renewed pressure today at gross declines of one to four points. Sales approximated 700,000 shares.

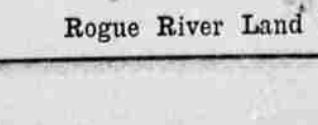
