CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Bearish sentiment on wheat received new impetus today on account of the suspension of the British American Continental bank in London. Opening prices, which ranged from half cent to 2c lower with March \$1.68 1/4 to \$1.69 and May \$1.62 1/4 to \$1.63 were followed by a moderate further setback and then something of a rally. Corn sympathized with the weakness of wheat. After opening 13c off to a like advance, including May at 74 to 75, the market hardened a little, but then sagged all around.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Metal shares were the stabilizing issues at the opening of today's stock market, most of the copper group, notably Inspiration and American Smelting advancing substantially over yesterday's final prices. The cheaper oils and prominent metals also were higher and Crucible Steel was strongest of the active shares at an advance of 1 1/2 points. Fractional gains ruled among specialties, but shippings and some of the rails eased. Preliminary quotations for exchange on London were higher, the demand rate of 3.55 1/2 showing a gain of half a cent over the maximum price quoted after the close of yesterday's dealings. Rubbers, textiles, shippings, equipments and rails at extreme gains of two to five points led another rally in the final hour. The closing was strong.
