

### BUILDING & LOAN ASSO. INCREASES CAPITAL STOCK

At the annual stockholders meeting of the Jackson County Building & Loan Association Scott V. Davis was elected to the directorate and C. M. Kidd and Dr. J. J. Emmens and Ralph Waldo Elden were elected directors.

The authorized capital stock of the association was increased from \$250,000 to \$1,000,000.

The business of the association has more than doubled during the past year and there is a demand at all times for money by those desiring to purchase or build homes, and it was to meet this need that it was voted to increase the capital stock.

More investment stockholders are desired by the association so that it may have the money to loan to those desiring to build or purchase homes. The investment stock pays not less than 7 per cent and the security is of the best.

The association is under the supervision of the directors, who are George T. Collins, John C. Mann, C. M. Kidd, T. W. Miles, Ralph Waldo Elden, Scott V. Davis, A. L. Hill, Dr. J. J. Emmens and O. C. Boggs.

At a meeting of the directors, following that of the stockholders, a semi-annual dividend of three and one-half per cent was declared, and the following officers were elected: C. M. Kidd, president; Dr. J. J. Emmens, vice president; T. W. Miles, treasurer, and O. C. Boggs, secretary and attorney.

It is hoped that the business of the association may steadily increase, as this appears to be the best solution of the housing problem in Medford.

This dispute between Finland and Sweden will in many ways be a test case that will determine the effectiveness of the Council of the League of Nations as an instrumentality for the settlement of disputes and the prevention of wars. Finland is pleased with the appointment of this American, who will wield much influence though he will have no official vote as the U. S. is not a member of the League.

### MINISTER CHARGED AS WHITE SLAVER

PASSAIC, N. J., Jan. 8.—The Rev. Cornelius Densel, former pastor of the First Reformed church here, was arrested today on a federal warrant charging violation of the Mann white slave act.

The arrest was the result of the alleged elopement of the clergyman with Miss Trina Hanneberg of this city, a former member of his church, during which it was charged they visited New York, Buffalo and other places.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Representative Welty, democrat, Ohio, attacked Governor Stephens of California today for sending to members of congress a letter bearing on the Japanese problem in California. Representative Welty declared he was surprised to find a governor "carrying on a propaganda of misrepresentation with the hope of establishing a special national laundry to wash the dirty linen of a state."

### GOV. STEPHENS' JAP PROPAGANDA ATTACKED, WELTY

Governor Stephens said in his letter to members of congress that in the desire to deal with Japanese question effectively and justly, California had an exhaustive research made of the entire Oriental problem which showed that there had been tremendous Japanese development in the state in the past decade.

Representative Welty replied that some of the governor's statements could hardly be justified by the 1920 census figures and added that "no unbiased mind can quite understand the statement of your land question, in prohibiting land ownership by Japanese, when the question could have been settled without giving offense and as effectively by making it unlawful for any alien to own land."

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—Attorneys for W. D. Whitcomb, receiver for Morris Brothers, Inc., had ready to file today in federal court a complete list of creditors of the bankrupt bond house so far as they were known. Receiver Whitcomb stated at a meeting of the creditors last night that liabilities of the concern were \$2,819,000 and that the shortage would be approximately \$500,000. Whitcomb announced that he would go to Seattle to attend a creditors' meeting next Wednesday.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Officials of the Baptist Ministers association, Chicago, were sternly rebuked by Judge Joseph David in the superior court here today because of a resolution passed by the association with reference to alleged abuses of the writ of habeas corpus in Chicago courts.

Judge David told the clergymen that the resolution was "based on the most flimsy hearsay and rumors of the press."

### AMERICAN QUAKERS TO FEED GERMAN CHILDREN

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—The relief work of the American Quakers now contemplates the feeding of 600,000 children daily in all parts of Germany. A total of 70,000,000 meals have been served since the work started in March 1920. The Quakers have extended their field of activity to the occupied zone in the American sector of the Rhineland.

The new plans of the Quakers include the extension of the feeding to the big industrial plants and a beginning will be made at the General Electric company's establishment.

The Ruhr coal fields are also included in the new areas to be added this year.

### 200 COLONELS PUT ON PAYROLL BY NEW GREEK GOVT.

ATHENS, Jan. 6.—Eighteen generals and more than 200 colonels were appointed in the Greek army today to replace adherents of former Premier Venizelos. In view of the movements in Thrace and Constantinople, doubts were entertained of the loyalty of the Venizelist officers and it was decided to retire them on pay.

Prince Andrew, brother of Constantinople, was among the new generals named, while Prince Christopher, also a brother of the king, was made a colonel.

ATHENS, Jan. 7.—Colonel Stefan Patzner, chief judge advocate under the Venizelos regime, who was assassinated Wednesday night by a party of soldiers, was buried today without military honors. Soldiers ordered to render the honors, says the colonel had been an unjust military magistrate.

### BERNSTORFF RUNS FOR REICHSTAG

KIEL, Germany, Jan. 6.—Count John Heinrich von Bernstorff, former German ambassador to the United States, who heads the democratic ticket for the reichstag elections in the new Schleswig-Holstein district, contributed an article to the Kiel Gazette, in the course of which he declares Germany should not have assumed an attitude of indifference to the League of Nations, despite its alleged present imperfect organization. He says he believes the league not wholly bereft of certain moral effect and that Germany's request to be received into it would have netted "important diplomatic benefits," and in all probability would have resolved itself into a diplomatic offensive.

### REPORT MONDAY ON PROHIBITION WAYS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Henry L. Ivey, chief of the special intelligence service of the bureau of internal revenue, was expected to return to Washington today to report Monday to Commissioner Williams on the investigation of prohibition frauds in New York.

Reports on the progress of similar investigation in various parts of the country are coming in steadily, officials declared.

### COURT THANKED FOR TERM IN PRISON

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 8.—James M. Coplen, who gave himself up to the sheriff at Portland a few weeks ago and confessed he had forged a check here requesting that he be sent back, was found guilty late yesterday and sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. The man, grey and stooped, murmured "thank you" as the judge imposed the sentence.
