3 BALLOONISTS ARRIVE SAFELY AFTER LONG HIKE

MATTICE, Ont., Jan. 11.—(By the Associated Press)—The three American naval balloonists stranded near Hudson bay when their big bag descended after a flight from Kookaway, N. Y., reached this rail head today after musing down from Moose Factory.

The officers—Lieutenants Louis A. Kloor, Jr., of New Orleans; Walter Hinton, of Bell Harbor, N. Y., and Stephen A. Farrell of New York—found a corps of newspaper men waiting to greet them when they entered this settlement at 2:20 p. m.

All three officers were in excellent condition. While definite plans have not been made for their departure for the east, it is believed they will leave here tonight. They reported no exciting incidents on their dog sled trip down from Moose Factory.

The first thing that Lieutenant Kloor did upon his arrival was to make a flat denial of the statement credited to Lieutenant Hinton that Lieutenant Farrell had offered his life to save his companions. The story had it that Farrell, worn out, had offered his body to his hungry fellow aviators as food.

Lieutenant Kloor declared that during the days they were wandering in the woods near Moose Factory their only food had been carrier pigeons. Adventure of a kind rarely known to humans of a hum-drum world befell the three in the performance of simple duty, a test flight in the routine of general department orders, to test air currents among the rocks above their home station at Kookaway, N. Y., on Dec. 13.

There were three carrier pigeons attached to the party and two of them were eaten by the officers, Lieutenant Kloor said. The third was dead, but was not eaten.

"The No. 4 adventure had nothing on this trip," Lieutenant Hinton said, and Lieutenant Kloor added that it had been the greatest adventure of his life.

Lieutenant Hinton declared he would rather cross the Atlantic on a seaplane five times than to make another journey such as the one which terminated here this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Secretary Daniels of the navy, on receiving word of the safe return of the naval balloonists, addressed to them the following message: "Warmest congratulations. News of your safety received with immense relief. The navy is proud of its intrepid air force which you and your companions so well represent."

training school, girls' industrial schools, the state hospitals or the institution for the feeble minded. Enactment of northwest uniform traffic laws. Prohibition Enforcement.

Provision for placing fines collected for violation of prohibition law in special fund for prosecution of law enforcement work. "I would be opposed to any alteration of the prohibition laws which would make them less effective," said the message. "If they can be amended so as to bring about better enforcement results, I will welcome such changes and be glad to give them my hearty approval."

Endorsed work of state highway commission and asked legislature to co-ordinate in its work in connection with roads with the work of the state commission. Conservation and protection of forests. Key to reforestation problem lies, said the message, in efforts to prevent fire and to keep fires from destroying new growth. Urged support of federal government in aerial patrol work.

A new record for the road run in an automobile from San Francisco to Portland was broken Saturday night when Clant McGee and Roy E. Skinner, in a Buick 1921 coupe, reached Portland after 29 hours and 16 minutes on the road. The mileage for the run was 751 miles. Road conditions were very unfavorable, McGee reported. In several places recent rains had made the roads almost impassable. The time was 44 minutes better than the Southern Pacific's fastest schedule. On this record breaking trip the car reached Medford in 15 hours from San Francisco.

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RIOTS IN INDIA CAUSE BLOODSHED

LONDON, Jan. 11.—Much bloodshed has resulted from the rioting of the peasantry in the Rai Bareilly district, southwest of Lucknow, India, it is reported in news dispatches today. Strong reinforcements of armed police have been dispatched to the affected region where parties of villagers have been destroying crops and causing other damage.

The military is held in readiness, but will not be employed, except as a last resource, it is declared. The cause of the trouble is stated to be the efforts of the landlords to suppress "soviets" established by the tenants who allege that they have been denied certainty of tenure in their land holdings and have been forced to submit to illegal extortions.
