## GERMAN RADICALS OPENLY DECLARE A WAR ON CAPITAL

BERLIN.—German radical disciples of what is called here "Red Russian terrorism," who say they are planning to overturn the present German government and establish a proletarian dictatorship, openly announce that they have drawn up lists of "capitalists and undesirables," who shall be killed when the revolution begins.

One of these men, a hotel waiter, who calls himself a "pencil leader," complained the other day that his list included "nearly everybody around here" who has influence, property or money. He said, a "superior" came to him one day and read a list of names, and announced these were to be the "pencil leader's" quota when the killings began.

The waiter declared he acknowledged "orders" but thought the program was being carried too far. "As leader in this precinct I am expected to kill a lot of folks when the revolution gets under way," he said. "My list is certainly big enough. What do you think about that?"

Apparently his opinion of his orders was very low, but when asked if he would carry them out if opportunity offered he merely laughed.

Radicals of the most pronounced tendencies toward revolution and destruction may be encountered everywhere. They appear quite proud of the fact that Germany today is "a land of the freest speech on earth," and sometimes ask what would happen to men who preached their doctrines in the United States. Frequently they are students, carrying along with their textbooks all sorts of radical literature. They discuss their "plans" with great liberty. One of them, a small, mild mannered person, of distinctly Slavic type, said it would be necessary to kill many people during the next revolution in order to impress upon the bourgeoisie that they "meant business."

"There will be piles of dead in the streets," he declared. "We'll just have to do it. We can't treat these bourgeoisie kindly, for they wouldn't appreciate it. We'll have to impress them with our earnestness. We will line them up by the score against buildings on the main streets and shoot them. We will want all to see what we're doing. That will throw a wholesome terror into the hearts of the reactionaries. Of course, I will do my share and if necessary will give my life to the cause."

Police authorities apparently are not much concerned about the "red terrorism," for their policy is to permit the radicals to have their say, and go their way in peace. Arrests are very infrequent.

## KAISER BUILT A MOSQUE GERMANY CAN'T PULL DOWN

WUENS DORF, Germany.—A reminder of the time when the former Emperor William attempted to pose as a leader in the Moslem world, remains here in the form of a Mohammedan mosque, which was erected by the Kaiser in the first years of the world war. Eight hundred orthodox adherents of the teachings of the Koran regularly worship in it.

It is the only mosque in Germany and William II built it for the benefit of the Cossack and Kirghis Tartar war prisoners who were captured while serving with the Russians and French. An internment camp surrounds it. Under the law of the Koran, the mosque must never be destroyed.

There has been considerable criticism of the former emperor for having erected it and for the present government for maintaining it. In reply, the officials declare it is their duty to give the interned Tartars an opportunity to worship according to the dictates of their faith. They point out that destruction of the mosque would be a serious offense in the eyes of all Mohammedans.

## 'NIGHTIE NIGHT' NOT A NAUGHTY PLAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—William Johnston, of San Francisco, member of the victorious American Davis cup tennis team, has been forced to postpone his departure for home from New Zealand because of the shipping strike and will remain with the team to compete in the exhibition matches in Melbourne, Australia. This word was contained in a cable message received from Sam Hardy, manager of the team by the United States Lawn Tennis association.

## NEW PREMIER OF GREECE NO FRIEND OF CONSTANTINE

ATHENS.—Demetrios Rhalis, the new Greek Premier, who succeeded Venizelos when the latter was defeated in the elections last autumn, hates the sight of Venizelos and has by no means always been an admirer of Constantine, who now has been recalled as king.

Rhalis regards Venizelos as a political adventurer. This, in part, may be due to the fact that when Venizelos came from Crete to Athens and gained the political ascendancy, Rhalis' reputation as a politician was somewhat damaged.

In his long political career, the new premier has generally been at loggerheads with the crown. He often had disputes with the late King George and it was not until Constantine was dethroned by the entente powers that Rhalis really regarded him seriously. This action of the entente, however, converted Rhalis to become a supporter of Constantine's cause and, since 1916, he has been devoted to that ruler.

Rhalis is one of the most interesting characters in Greece. He is a polished statesman and is often referred to as a "dear old man." (He is about 80).

His favorite pets are goats and fowls, which he owns in great numbers, and feeds with his own hands. When not in public office he practices his profession of the law. In his younger days he spent a considerable fortune in politics.

## MERCHANT TAILORS SEE VALUE, ADVERTISING

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 11.—More than 300 delegates from all parts of the west were here for the opening today of the second annual convention of the Pacific Coast Merchant Tailors association.

Sam S. Levy of Los Angeles, president of the organization, announced the convention would be tasked to endorse a plan to spend \$5,000,000 for national advertising to "educate the men of America to the value of made-to-measure clothes."

He said every tailors' exchange of the Pacific coast had endorsed the plan.

## EVENING DRESS WEDDINGS ARE BANNED BY PASTOR

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 11.—Evening weddings at Calvary Protestant Episcopal church were banned by Rev. J. E. VanEtten, pastor, today. In his New Year's sermon the pastor paid much attention to evening gowns worn by women. He commented on the "lack of decorum often manifested" and said that some of the gowns did not conform with the sacred character of marriage.

## Bandits Get \$20,000.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 11.—Two bandits slugged a messenger just as he was emerging from the Produce Exchange bank today, seized a satchel containing \$20,000 in cash and \$8,000 in checks and made their escape in an automobile.

## NEW JERSEY OPPOSES SUNDAY RESTRICTION

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 11.—Governor Edwards in his message to the incoming New Jersey legislature today urged rejection of any bill designed to bring about a restrictive Sunday.

"The spirit of restricting and encroaching upon the liberties of the people in this country through legislation apparently advocated by those forces which brought about adoption of the eighteenth amendment to the federal constitution and the Volstead act is so entirely un-American that I am sure it can never prevail," he said.

"It has been the vain but futile hope of misguided people for many years to be able to legislate morals into a community."
