F. W. HUTCHISON, AN OLD PIONEER, PASSES AWAY

F. W. Hutchison, one of Jackson county's best known pioneers, died at 6 o'clock last night at the residence of his son, C. I. Hutchison.

Francis William Hutchison was born August 5, 1838 near Dayton, O., being the oldest son of George and Cynthia Louise Hutchison. He was married to Mary Ann Brower, Feb-ruary 20, 1862, and to this union one son, C. I. Hutchison of Medford, was born. Mrs. Hutchison died March 2, 1896.

Mr. Hutchison came west in 1852, and has made his home in Medford with his son since that time. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. E. M. Lundsten of Medford and Mrs. Rose R. Charles of Los Angeles. Three brothers are left to mourn the de-ceased, J. J. Hutchison of Florida, Warren M. Hutchison of Lago, Ind., and Amos I. Hutchison of Warsaw, Ind.

The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at Per's under-taking parlors.

(Continued From Page One) commission ever issued a permit to the defunct bond house that would permit it to sell preferred stock in the corporation. If such a permit was not issued, then Morris, and perhaps Ether-idge, will be required to answer under the blue sky law, which has, it is said, heretofore been thwarted completely in getting a hold on the affairs of the concern.

Such preferred stock is known to have been sold to the public in con-siderable quantities and to a large total value.

Another Angle An equally interesting possibility and one equally serious to the person-nel of the bankrupt company is the possibility that Morris Brow sold in-terim certificates calling for preferred stock in the corporation, before such preferred stock existed in any more tangible style than the imagination of the heads of the company.

There, again, is a subject for the re-search of the corporation commission-er, Gebhardt intimated. It is not con-ceivable, authorities point out, that financial propriety would shield the sale of stock that did not exist.

(Continued from Page One) call for such a conference to be held in Washington, it could be accomplished in sixty days," said he.

Asked whether he had any knowl-edge of a "sincere desire" on the part of the other world powers for a dis-armament agreement, General Bliss said that some good might come from a reduction of naval building by the United States, Great Britain and Japan for five years as provided in the pending Borah resolution if it were regard-ed as a prelude to a permanent agree-ment. He thought, however, that naval building already under contract in this country should be completed.

He said that in conversations with former Premier Clemenceau and Or-lando and Premier Lloyd George and other representatives of the allied pow-ers in addition to the high military of-ficials he had found a universal "dread and horror" at the international situ-ation and the potentialities for world chaos resulting from the world war.
