

### MRS. E. E. KELLY IS NEW MEMBER SCHOOL BOARD

Mrs. E. E. Kelly is the new member of the school board, who replaces Mrs. Richard Smythe, resigned recently because of removal from the city. Her resignation was accepted by the board at its meeting this week, as was that of Miss Rena Schott of Salem, one of the domestic science teachers in the high school.

The board members had knowledge for some time past that Mrs. Smythe was going to resign, so they carefully looked around for a competent successor to fill out her unexpired term, hence at the same meeting in which Mrs. Smythe's resignation was accepted the board unanimously appointed Mrs. Kelly. Mrs. Kelly's husband who is a traveling salesman will change to a California territory which necessitates his residence in that state, hence her resignation. Mr. and Mrs. Smythe left the city Saturday night.

Miss Schott, who is teacher of cooking in the high school, is a graduate of the O. A. C., taught in Elgin, Ore., the past two years before coming to Medford, and resigns to be married in the near future.

The board then offered the position by telegraph to Miss Grace Mitchell of Medford, who is teaching this year at Kallispel, Mont., from whom Superintendent Smith received a telegram last night rejecting the offer, inasmuch as she receives a salary of \$1800 at Kallispel and the Medford position only pays \$1500.

The board then tendered the position, also by wire, to Bertha Hendrick, an experienced domestic science teacher, at present teaching in the Garyville, La., schools, who is a graduate of the O. A. C., and had taught four years in Colorado. It is thought she will accept. Miss Schott's resignation takes effect next week.

### ANDREW J. FLOREY OF EAGLE POINT DIES, AGED 81

Andrew J. Florey died at his home at Eagle Point January 12, at the age of 81 years. Mr. Florey was born at Decatur, Ill., in the year 1839. He served four years in the Civil war, came to Oregon in 1854, settling at Eagle Point, where he served as post master for 20 years. He was married Dec. 25, 1886 to Etta A. Nye. To this union was born seven children, 6 of whom survive and reside in Jackson county.

They are Mrs. Wm. Von der Hellen, Chauncey Florey, Andrew Florey, Jr., Mrs. Raymond Peter, Theo. Florey and Judge Florey.

Funeral services will be held at the parlors of Weeks-Conger Co., Friday, January 14, at 2 p. m., with Rev. Millard officiating. Interment will be in Central Point cemetery.

### News From the Legislature

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 13.—Senator O. B. Robertson of Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties has a bill to increase the fees paid by state banks so that a more efficient state banking department may be maintained.

Most of the bankers of the state, he said, are in favor of the measure and willing to pay higher fees for examinations so that more time may be given them.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 13.—Millions of dollars worth of property will be added to the tax rolls of Oregon and the assessed valuation of property in the state will be given a boost if a bill to be introduced in the legislature next week by Senator Jones of Lane county is enacted.

Senator Jones proposes a law providing that all churches, hospitals, private schools and all other institutions that are now exempt from taxation must be placed on the tax rolls, as well as all land owned by institutions of this kind.

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B. Kramer today reported the arrest of the owners of the Fairmont Creamery of Green Bay, one of the largest in the state, and alleged to be indirectly managed from headquarters in Nebraska and the seizure of 15,000 pounds of butter and 610 cans of liquid eggs.

It was alleged the butter and eggs were held in cold storage in violation of state laws, with no marks to show on what date the articles were placed in storage.

OAKLAND, Cal., Jan. 13.—Crazed by drinking illicit brandy, William Hickey today ran his automobile up and down and all around the Southern Pacific railroad tracks in the West Oakland yards and fought a gun battle with policemen who tried to stop him. He fired a revolver with one hand while madly driving his machine with the other. Six policemen in pursuit fired revolvers and shotguns after him, but to no result until the mad race had continued for more than a mile, when Hickey was arrested.

### EXPECT AIR FLEET AT CANAL ZONE SUNDAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—Ten of the twelve naval seaplanes of the F-5-L group, making the flight from San Diego to the Canal Zone, took off yesterday from La Union, Salvador, for the Gulf of Nicoya, Costa Rica, 312 miles distant, according to a radio message today.

It is expected that the machines will reach the Canal Zone Sunday.

The four remaining airships of the squadron making the flight, were still at La Union, the navy headquarters said.

ate, providing for a federal livestock commission of three members whose duty it is to regulate the packers, the stockyards, the commission men and the traders.

"The registration feature of the Gronna bill," said the report, "if it should work out as intended would provide branch house facilities for independent packers and thereby provide competition."

**Expect Packers' Opposition**

The report also outlined the Anderson bill now pending in the house of representatives, providing for the regulation of the packers by the federal trade commission and the regulation of the stockyards, commission men and traders by the Interstate commerce commission.

"It remains to be seen," said the report, "how strenuously the packers will oppose the Anderson bill, but it is a safe bet that they and the other market agencies will oppose any bill which will interfere with the present system of market domination. During the five years of our activities they have consistently shown their unalterable determination to either rule or ruin the industry. They often change their tactics but never their business morals. It would be a rash man who would say that they are not partly responsible for the present deplorable condition of the industry. Undoubtedly they hope to stall off legislation during the short session of congress.
