ANNUAL BANQUET ASHLAND CHAMBER THURSDAY NIGHT

ASHLAND, Jan. 19.—"Chamber of Commerce week" was ushered in Tuesday noon, by a forum luncheon at Hotel Austin, Mayor Lamkin presiding, with D. E. Millard in the title role of impressario, leading the community sing. Major E. E. Kelly, of Medford, was the principal speaker, his topic being "Possibilities of Oil in the Rogue River Valley." On Wednesday at 3 p. m., Hotel Austin being the meeting place, Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Tourist association, met Ashland citizens who are interested in tourist travel, and discussed the merits of Ashland as a resort center on the line of transcontinental passenger traffic during the tourist season. On Thursday, Jan. 20, occurs the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet at the armory, notable viands on the menu being home products. Accompaniments to the feast will be music and brief addresses. Banquet at 6:30, followed at 8:30 by the illustrated lecture, "The Lure of the Northwest," as depicted by Frank Branch Riley, distinguished American humorist, lecturer and traveler. Tickets to banquet, including lecture, one dollar.

Funeral services in honor of Leo Parrish, local soldier boy who died in France, were held at the armory, Sunday afternoon, the body having arrived the morning of that date. The tribute to the young soldier's memory was delivered by Rev. C. A. Edwards, Methodist pastor, a men's quartet affording the musical accompaniments. Six members of the local post of the American Legion bore the flag-draped casket, and a squad from First company fired the regulation military salute. Interment was in the family plot in Ashland cemetery. Leo formerly resided here. He enlisted in the quartermaster's corps, San Francisco, in 1917, went overseas, and died in a hospital in France, Oct. 11, 1918. The young soldier's wife, father and mother, all now living elsewhere, came to Ashland to attend the funeral.

P. B. Fitzpatrick, former railroad employe living here, is now conductor on the Santa Fe running through Stockton, Fresno, and other central California sections. His residence is at Riverbank.

Paul, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Guley, and Robert, son of Dr. and Mrs. R. L. Burdick, tied for first honors at the bay show held at the Winter Fair, results of the technical clinic having just been announced. Nixon, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Denton, also scored honors on a 99 per cent basis.

The American Legion, locally, will enter the athletic field, several of its members qualifying in a basketball organization. Millard Grubb is athletic director of Ashland post. Already overtures have been made to try conclusions with the speedy teams of adjacent towns.

Directors of the State bank are O. Winter, F. D. Wagner, E. V. Carter, C. H. Vampel, G. W. Dunn, T. H. Simpson, and W. H. McNaire. Winter is president, Wagner vice-president, and G. G. Eubanks, cashier. Twenty per cent increase in savings deposits was reported for the year, while the net earnings upon capital stock of \$25,000 aggregated 13 per cent.

Incident to a campaign being made by internal revenue deputies throught the state to assist in making out income tax returns, Messrs. Wilkinson and Hewitt, of the collector's office in Portland will be in Ashland from Feb. 10 to 15, at city hall. In the meantime obtain your blanks and study up the respective schedules.

Services at the Christian church last Sunday were conducted by Oliver Hargus, student at the Bible university, Eugene.

Fifteen teachers in the local schools are availing themselves of the extension course afforded by the State university. "Recent Tendencies in Education" forms the chief topic in which the educators are being coached. Prof. J. C. Almack, assistant director of the extension division, is the instructor, two hours each week being devoted to this study, successively in a number of towns throughout southern Oregon.

The executive committee of Ashland Post No. 14, American Legion, includes Commander Simpson, Vice-Commander Wolcott, Adjutant Spencer, Finance Officer Holmes, Historian Hadfield, Officer Grubb, Insurance Solicitor Mills, Chaplain Rigg, and Sergeant-at-Arms Gunter. The design is to give a series of noon-time luncheons at which the social feature will share in the business deliberations.

Evidences of substantial increases in business are most gratifying, the last statement indicating over \$600,000 as the volume of deposits, with total resources of nearly \$750,000. The Citizens is the bank with the burglar alarm system.

Recent burglar clearings include breaking into the fruit stand at the depot, also entering the Woods residence on Gresham street, from which

latter place several articles of value were taken.

E. B. Adamson continues as cashier of the Bank of Talent. The directorate includes Joshua Patterson, L. J. Sleppy, C. W. Holdridge, J. F. Holdridge, and E. B. Adamson. Patterson is president and Holdridge vice-president.

The first installment of 3000 gas cylinders for the Ashland Natural Carbonic Co. has arrived from central western factories, a gas compressor being included in the equipment. This shipment will be used at the gas plant which is being developed at the Pompadour Mineral Springs. More of the cylinders will arrive in due season, the initial shipment being about 500.

Beginning with the present month, Friday evening each week, except the first Friday of the month, will be reserved at Masonic hall by Ashland lodge No. 23, as a certain well-defined schedule for conferring degrees, in order to standardize a specific date for this purpose. In the meantime members will please take notice of this appointment, which is a new departure adopted by the officers as a board of trustees.

CARTER AND THOMAS FOR STATE BONUS

At the meeting of the American Legion last night, letters were read from Senator C. M. Thomas and Representative E. V. Carter, both members of the Oregon legislature from Jackson county, in which they stated that they favored a bill providing adjusted compensation for Oregon ex-service persons. They also suggested that Medford post send a delegation to Salem to assist in putting the measure thru when it came up for final action. Members of the legion expressed themselves as favoring the long time loan feature of the proposed bill.

A business meeting of the women's auxiliary was held at the same hour, after which the two organizations held a social session at which refreshments were served by the ladies of the auxiliary.

K. OF P. INITIATES FORTY CANDIDATES

Another record-breaking class of forty-one men were duly initiated in the mysteries of the rank of esquire in the order of Knights of Pythias at the Castle Hall of Tulliaman Lodge last Monday night. There were two hundred members present to witness this impressive work and to partake of the excellent banquet prepared by Captain Reed. MANSFIELD—Nancy Missouri Mansfield, wife of James N. Mansfield died at her home in the Blackwell Hill district from apoplexy, aged 67 years, six months, 19 days. She was born at Lone Jack, Mo., June 29th, 1853. Her parents emigrated to Oregon in 1853 and settled in the Willamette valley. In 1860 her parents came to Jackson county. December 28th, 1871 she was married to James N. Mansfield in the Dry Creek district. She had been a resident of the old home place for the past 42 years. She leaves her husband James N., two sons, Wm. A. of Reedspoint, Ore., and Homer R. of Hillsboro, Ore., and one daughter, Mrs. A. A. Boyce of Central Point, Ore. The funeral services will be held at the home Friday, Jan. 21, at 1 p. m. Interment in Rock Point cemetery.

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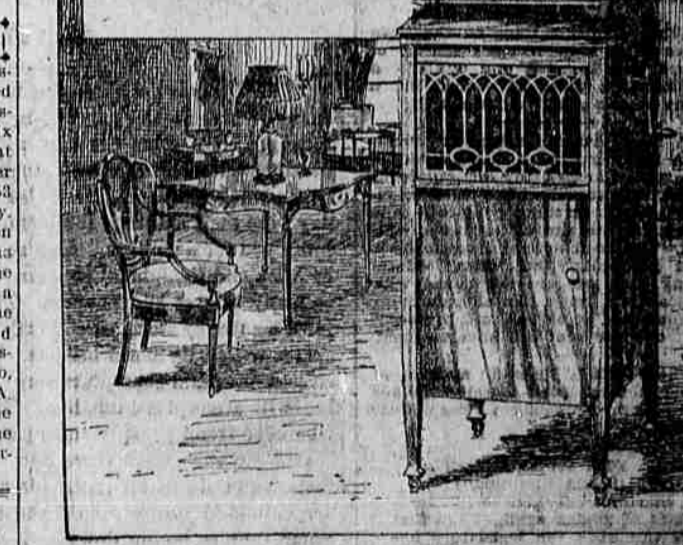
