This will be a big interesting meeting to which all farmers and others interested in the movement are invited.

## CHRONICLE PRAISES GODOWSKY RECITAL

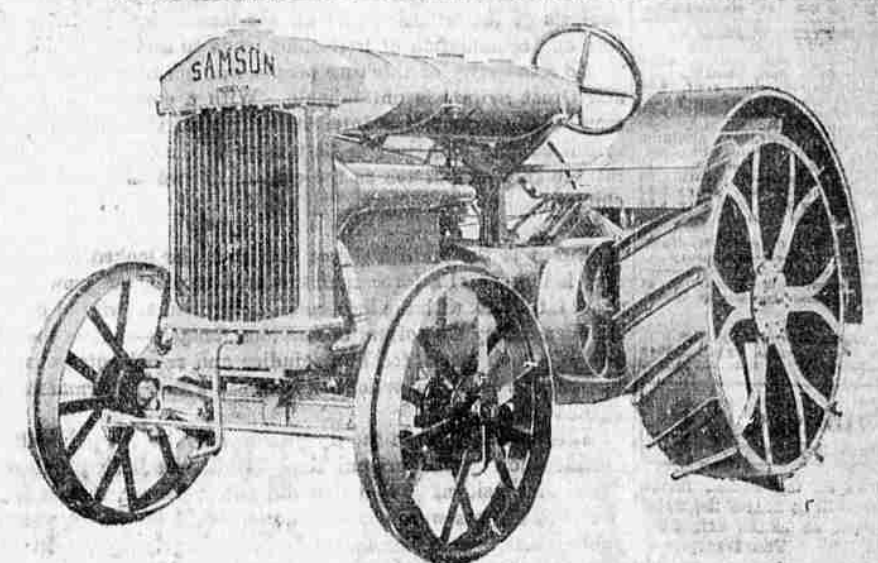
