N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Following its usual course, the market became quiet at mid-day, but for the most part gains were fully maintained. American Agricultural Chemical company and preferred, were among the exceptions, declining 2 and 3 1/2 points respectively, in connection with reports of prospective financing. Money tendencies became firmer in the last hour, such leaders as Mexican Petroleum, Crucible and Ashphalt led to a reaction of 1 to 3 points. The closing was irregular. Regardless of unfavorable industrial conditions, bull points were active again in the stock market today. Steels, equipments, shippings and motors were most favored. Sales approximated 450,000 shares.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—There was a perceptible broadening of the market at higher prices during the morning, despite intermittent offerings of shorts. Equipments were especially prominent, Pressed Steel Car common rising 7 points and the preferred 4 1/2. Railway Steel Spring and Crucible, Lackawanna, Republic Steel, Sloss-Sheffield Steels were strong, as well as Baldwin Locomotive, General Electric, Studebaker and allied issues. Oils rallied easily and leathers, tobaccos, sugar and paper issues representing further gains. Delaware, Lackawanna and Western extended its gain to ten points, other strong rails including Reading, Southern and Northern Pacific and Pittsburg and West Virginia. Exchange on London was firm but call loans held at last week's prevailing rate of 7 per cent.

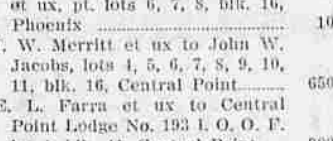
