DEBT BURDEN IS GUARANTEE OF WAR PREVENTION

HAMILTON, Bermuda. — Former President William H. Taft, who is spending a month here, said in an interview today that "the enormous burden of debt of every country makes it almost indispensable that the necessity for armament be removed. You can only do that by joint action and joint agreements and by promises of settling all differences without fighting."

"They are already discussing seriously in the United States an agreement for disarmament or the limiting of armament and strangely enough this comes in part at least, from men who have been vigorously opposed to any league at all," he continued.

"I am very hopeful that under Mr. Harding we shall reach a conclusion with other leading nations for an association or league which shall mark the advance brought about by the war toward reasonable machinery for the avoidance of future conflicts. This will involve the sitting around the council table of all important nations and will imply the taking of joint measures to compose differences and to restrain a resort to the unsatisfactory and bloody arbitrament of war."

"Lately I have often been questioned as to the attitude of the United States toward Great Britain. Of course the United States consists of some 112,000,000 people with many different currents of thought permeating the mass. Many different groupings too will be found and there are some of these groups, more vocal than representative of real public opinion who manifest bitter feeling against Britain. But when an important question arises, when a real issue comes before us, then the sober public opinion of the United States asserts itself."

"I never have had the slightest concern over the relations of the two countries. We form the strongest union for peace between nations that exists in the world today. We have got into the habit of settling all our differences by means of negotiation and arbitration. The great body of the people in the United States cannot conceive of a war between the two countries because they are confident that any matters in dispute can and will be settled either by negotiation or by the judgment of a court as with people in any domestic jurisdiction where law and order prevail."

Speaking of business conditions in the United States, he said they were not alarming. "We are a very resilient people and can fight our way out," he said. "Congress is attempting to help in the matter of credits."

LUMBER MONOPOLY IMPOSSIBLE SAYS OSHKOSH EXPERT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 26.—"It would be practically an impossibility for the National Lumber Manufacturers' association or any other organization to control any other output or the prices of lumber if they should attempt to do so," according to O. T. Swan, Oshkosh, Wis., secretary of the Northern Hemlock and Hardwood Manufacturers' association, which will hold its annual convention here January 27, in reply to a query from the convention division, Milwaukee Association of Commerce.

"There are some forty thousand mills in the United States," said Mr. Swan. "They are in active competition. The southern states and north middle and west. Lumber from the south, west and north all meet here in active competition."

"It is understood that the data compiled by the federal trade commission was secured about a year ago and it is based upon a period when lumber, in common with every other commodity, was on a constantly increasing upward grade. Relative supply and demand did it. That it was purely an economic adjustment is amply proved by the fact that lumber was the first of the great commodities to fall in value along with farm products to the levels of several years ago."

"Lumber has declined during the past few months from forty to sixty per cent. Mill work and interior finish for houses have shown the same decline so that today no one need hesitate about building a home on account of the lumber and mill work."

America Means Life to These Hungry Children of Far Poland



Bread lines are still a tragic necessity in Poland. In fact more than 3,500,000 children are ill or hungry in Eastern and Central Europe. This photograph shows a line of war orphans in Poland waiting for their only meal of the day at an American relief station. These stations will have to be discontinued unless the European Relief Council is able to raise \$33,000,000 to feed and care for these youngsters until the next harvest in September. The co-operating agencies forming the Council are the American Relief Administration, the American Red Cross, the American Friends' Service Committee (Quakers), the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, the Knights of Columbus, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. Unless the call is heeded immediately the Council will be unable to feed these innocent youngsters. Contributions are being received by your local committee or Franklin K. Lane, treasurer of the Council, who has offices at 42 Broadway, New York City. Herbert Hoover is chairman of the Council.

Latest Forecast Harding Cabinet

Much more can be said for than against the latest forecast of the Harding cabinet. It shows the president-elect still true to his first choice as to most of the places, and the addition of Governor Lowden and ex-Senator Sutherland to the list is a welcome sign that political and personal friendship has given way to consideration of the quality of men.

But the name of Herbert Hoover is still missing, and the omission detracts from the public approval which would otherwise greet Mr. Harding's selections. Mr. Hoover's proved administrative ability and high-minded public service are regarded by the people in general as a national asset which should be used by the new administration and if, as is suspected, he is to be left out in deference to the omity of a factional leader, ninety per cent of the people will be intensely disappointed, and the new administration will lose far more than it will gain by conciliating a factional leader who continually requires to be conciliated anew.—Portland Oregonian.

WORLD'S RECORD FOR STRIKES IS BROKEN, VIENNA

VIENNA, Jan.—Vienna set what is probably a new record for strikes in the year just ended. There were 227 of them in this city, partial or complete, wild or organized.

Eight of them were carried over into the new year, having taken in the closing week of 1920. The most recent of the strikes included employees of government printing plants, workers at the mint, actors and orchestras of the national theaters, railway employees, women's tailors, dentists' assistants, city employees and the gold and silver-miners.

Of all the strikes which Vienna has experienced in the last 12 months, not one lasted the full 24 hours, not one closed the coffee houses for five days, as the result of a demand for increased pay on the part of the employees. The Vienna coffee house means vastly more to the resident of Vienna than the club means to the average American or Englishman.

There are thousands of Viennese who transact most of their business in the coffee houses, though they have offices and staffs of clerks. Germans say that the Austrian's passion for sitting in the coffee houses all day accounts for the fact that he had, before the war, but a small share of the world's foreign trade.

There are several reasons for this coffee house habit. One is that the Viennese goes there to rest, and most of them appear to have been born tired. He also grudges himself the price of a newspaper, but in the coffee house he obtains free the privilege of reading nearly every Austrian newspaper and many from foreign countries, besides the illustrated weeklies and monthlies. In the course of time he acquires the privilege of occupying a table before one of the spacious windows for which the Vienna coffee houses are renowned and whence he may watch the procession of women passing.
