Notice is hereby given, that whereas, heretofore a petition was filed with the county court for Jackson County, Oregon, for the holding of an election by the voters of Jackson County, Oregon, on the question as to whether said county should issue its bonds in the sum of \$500,000, for permanent road improvement, in accordance with the provisions of the constitution and the laws of Oregon; upon which petition an order was entered calling a special election for May 21st, 1920, and, Whereas, said election was held, and a majority of 1860 voted in favor of the issuance of such bonds, and Whereas, on June 7, 1920 and January 24, 1921, said county court made orders issuing \$250,000 of said bonds, and directing this advertisement for bids thereon.

Now Therefore, notice is hereby given, that Jackson County, Oregon, offers for sale, to the highest bidder for cash, its said bonds in said sum, payable as follows, to-wit:

\$100,000 in ten years from the date thereof.
\$100,000 in fifteen years from the date thereof.
\$50,000 in twenty years from the date thereof.

Said bonds draw interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, and have attached interest coupons.
