Whereas, said election was held, and a majority of 1860 voted in favor of the issuance of said bonds, and

Whereas, on June 7, 1920 and January 24, 1921, said county court made orders issuing \$250,000 of said bonds, and directing this advertisement for bids thereon.

Now Therefore, notice is hereby given, that Jackson County, Oregon, offers for sale, to the highest bidder for cash, its said bonds in said sum, payable as follows, to-wit:

\$100,000 in ten years from the date thereof.

\$50,000 in fifteen years from the date thereof.
