

RAILROAD IS FINANCED BY ITS PATRONS

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—The sale of one railroad and the lease of another which virtually amounts to eventual disposal of both parts of the railroad projects of the late John R. Walsh, was announced today.

Banks of the Chicago clearing house association took over the assets when they took over Walsh's assets. The Illinois Southern railroad, running from Salem, Ill., to Springfield, Mo., was sold to a new company financed by shippers along the line.

The purchase price is said to have been less than \$1,000,000. In buying it years ago, Walsh paid \$7,000,000. It is said the loss to bondholders will be about \$3,000,000 while holders of \$5,000,000 in common and preferred stock will receive nothing.
