## CAROL HEARING IS POSTPONED UNTIL THURSDAY

Arnold R. Carol, extradited from California last week for the alleged theft of a Buick automobile from the Medford Auto company, was arraigned in Justice of the Peace Taylor's court this afternoon at 2 o'clock, and asked for a continuance until Saturday. Carol claimed that two Portland attorneys had been retained to defend him, and that it would require much time for them to come and get ready for trial. The court, however, set the preliminary hearing for Thursday and committed Carol to the county jail.

It is thought that relatives of Carol in Virginia will come to his rescue and endeavor to settle the case out of court if possible. He is a nice appearing youth, claiming to be 19 years of age, though when he was deekering for the auto he signed a document giving his age as 27 years.

Carol told the authorities that he served in France during the war, and when he returned he was left a legacy by his mother, who had died while he was away. He spent this money, and traveled over the country. He says that his present difficulty is his first brush with the law.

## RIFLE FIRE STIRS MATEWAN TRIAL TO FEVER HEAT

Federal soldiers and deputy sheriffs were hurried into the mountains surrounding Williamson today at the sound of rifle firing. Careful search failed to reveal the riflemen. There were no casualties but there were widely circulated rumors that bullets had fallen in the city.

Intense excitement prevailed for a time but the presence of a company of the 19th United States infantry calmed the fears of those who professed to believe that an attempt would be made to rescue the 21 men on trial here for the Matewan shooting.

The excitement had died down and the detail of soldiers had returned to their quarters here when Judge R. D. Bailey opened the fourth day of the trial.

In the courthouse were 290 additional onlookers ready for examination.

## Wants Government Leases Extended Twenty-five Years

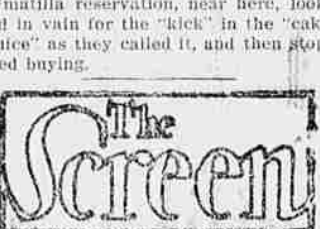


Chief Arthur Bonnacamp, Osage Indian, who is in Washington trying to have Government leases to his people extended for twenty-five years.
