

PORT OF SEATTLE WINS FIGHT IN SUPREME COURT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The port of Seattle won its fight in the supreme court today for title to valuable waterway rights in Seattle harbor.

Lower court decrees upholding the claim of railroads having terminals on the harbor to riparian rights through ownership of land adjacent to the improved harbor were restored, the higher court holding that no such rights existed under Washington state laws.

The area in dispute was described as being "within the boundaries of the east waterway in the harbor of Seattle and lying between the west boundary and the United States government pier headline in the waterway."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The appeal of Judge Ben D. Lindsay of the Denver juvenile court from conviction on charges of criticism of court, was dismissed today by the supreme court.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The Eastman Kodak company today withdrew its appeal to the supreme court from lower court decrees in the government's anti-trust suit against it.

The lower court decrees, issued in August 1916, provided for the dissolution of certain trade commissions and contracts. The company today asked that the mandate carrying out this decision be issued at once.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Laws of Alaska imposing taxes on byproducts of the herring fishing industry were upheld today by the supreme court. The opinion of the court was given in the suit brought by the Alaska Fish Salting Company against Walslein G. Smith, as treasurer of the territory, to recover \$10,000 paid as taxes on fish oil and fish meal produced by the company in 1917 and 1918.

REPARATION TERMS FOLLY SAYS PAPER

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Alleged reparation terms decided upon by the supreme council in Paris last week were described as "folly" by the Manchester Guardian today. The newspaper said: "We may be thankful the terms can never be executed."

I see the day approaching when everything that is new will be shown to the public by the motion picture, whether it be architecture, interior decoration or fashion, and because it can show one hundred million people that which in other times it was difficult to show to a few, the role of the artist in modern society instead of being limited, will, on the contrary, become more important than ever.

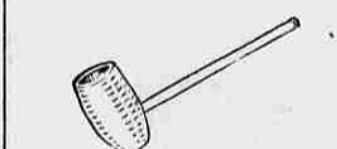
