**AMERICAN LEGION  
SMOKER IS VOTED  
RECORD BREAKER**

The American Legion smoker held Tuesday evening at the post headquarters in the M. F. & H. building was voted the best entertainment of its kind ever given in this city. In the neighborhood of 400 men partook of the hospitality of the legion, with the G. A. R. veterans and the city council occupying the front seats. After the show, waffles and coffee were served.

Prof. Jack Hemstreet staged his mesmerism performance and had a class of eight well known young men performing all sorts of odd stunts from singing songs to barking for a side-show. This number amused the large crowd who had a good laugh.

**MOORE OBJECTS TO  
INCREASING COST  
OF J. BANK TRIALS**

Prosecutor Rawles Moore has asked the court for an extension of time to present arguments in the motion of attorneys for F. D. Hines, indicted in relation to the Bank of Jacksonville failures, for a change of venue on the ground of prejudice. The prosecutor was originally granted until Tuesday morning for this purpose. The court intimated then that he might grant the plea for a change of venue. The prosecutor will file affidavits contending that the prejudice alleged against the defendant is not sufficient to prevent him from securing a fair trial.

Prosecutor Moore said Tuesday afternoon that he had no strenuous objections to one case, or even two being transferred to another county, but that there were twelve cases and 57 indictments in the bank cases, and that the granting of one might result in an avalanche of motions for changes of venue and that with a precedent established they might reasonably expect to be granted. This would result in heavy additional expense to the county, and the moving of a large part of the machinery of the prosecutor's office away for an extended period.

Among the cases coming before the grand jury when it convenes February 21 will be that of W. F. DeWitt, an Ashland taxi driver blamed by a coroner's jury for the death of Mrs. Nona Jennings, killed in an auto accident on the Pacific Highway Christmas eve near Talent. DeWitt waived the preliminary hearing, and is out on bonds. The grand jury, it is said, will continue a further probe into the Bank of Jacksonville failure.

The trial of Lark Evans, granted a retrial by the supreme court, on the grounds of new evidence, after a conviction for assault and robbery last fall will be heard at the petit jury term which begins February 28th. This case holds more than ordinary interest to a large number of Jackson county people, and promises to be one of the hardest fought cases in the history of local jurisprudence. Evans is out on bonds.

**POLICE ARREST  
ALLEGED SHORT  
CHANGE ARTISTS**

Two men and a woman who arrived in the city by auto from the north last night are being held by the police on the suspicion that they are short change artists, and that they made a number of unsuccessful attempts at Gold Hill, Central Point and here late Tuesday to short change merchants by the \$20 bill and rapid conversation game. However, the police say that the persons under arrest had no connection with the short change man here Saturday.

Short change artists victimized a number of Grants Pass merchants yesterday, according to reports here, and some of the victims of that city were expected to come to Medford this afternoon to look over the suspects.

It develops that the two men and woman first showed up at Gold Hill at 5 p. m. Tuesday, one of them visiting a hardware store, making a small purchase and tendering a \$20 bill in payment. The party next appeared at Central Point at 5:50 p. m. where one of the men tried to work the same game in three stores.

The trio's next appearance was at the Bungalow grocery on North Riverside where the same stunt was tried on Mrs. Jacobs, who quickly told her husband and he at once informed the police. The night patrolmen succeeded in locating the three last night. In their auto was found a satchel filled with small purchases, such as tobacco, cigarette papers, soap cakes, pins and the like.

While the police claim the stories told by the men are conflicting and far from convincing, they can not be held long as so far there is no evidence against them. They may be identified by Grants Pass merchants, however.

is \$6,913,457, a reduction of \$28,086,569 from estimates and \$13,986,000 less than was appropriated for this year.

An appropriation of \$550,000 for yards and stations on the Atlantic and Gulf coasts is recommended, while \$4,907,000 is proposed for yards on the Pacific and in Hawaii. Among the provisions for expenditures on the Pacific coast are \$325,000 for the Mare Island, Cal., navy yard; \$1,405,000 for the Puget Sound, Washington, navy yard; \$1,025,000 for the naval station
