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JANUARY RAIN FALL HEAVY BUT WEATHER MILD

The month of January was a moist month but not record breaking with its 3.12 inches of precipitation against 30 year average of 4.35. This is the heaviest precipitation for January, however, since 1914. There were 15 days with .01 or more precipitation, and the greatest rainfall in one day was .74 of an inch, on the 30th. The precipitation for the month included 1 1/2 inches of snow. There were only two clear days in January, 24 days being cloudy and five partly cloudy.

The maximum temperature for the month was 46.4 and the mean minimum 32.4. The maximum temperature was 59 degrees and the mean 19 degrees. The greatest daily range was 25. There were thirteen so-called killing frosts in January on the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 28th and 30th.
