

GOLD HILL BOOZE MAKER GETS A 3 MONTH SENTENCE

The authorities are somewhat reticent about giving out information on the case of Carl Dusenberry, the Gold Hill soft drinks establishment owner, arrested recently on the charge of having intoxicating liquor in his possession, but it now seems that this arrest is connected with that of Horace Greer who was arrested shortly before for operating a still and making whiskey at his island home two miles above Gold Hill.

The charge against Dusenberry was withdrawn in Justice Taylor's court yesterday by the county prosecutor, to enable the federal authorities to handle the case, and Dusenberry was at once taken in charge by a deputy United States marshal and was to have been arraigned before P. Roy Davis, United States commissioner, this afternoon.

According to information given out following the arrest the charge against Dusenberry grew out of finding a quantity of hard cider in his place. But according to the Gold Hill News, Greer after being arrested by Deputy Sheriff Joe McMahon confessed to making whiskey in his still and to selling it to Dusenberry.

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WALKER DEMURRER SUSTAINED, OTHERS ARE NOT ALLOWED

In the circuit court Thursday, Judge Calkins sustained the demurrer to the indictment of A. W. Walker, in connection with the Bank of Jacksonville, and denied similar action interposed in behalf of S. T. Johnstone, J. E. Bartlett, Elmer Quigley, and Ben M. Collins.

The indictment against Walker alleged "aiding and abetting" in the defrauding of the Bank of Jacksonville, and embraced two counts. Attorney Newbury for Walker argued that there was no proof of crime, and further that if there had been, it was nullified by the expiration of the statutes of limitations. The transactions upon which Walker was indicted are said to have taken place in 1907.

Friends of Mr. Walker and his attorney assert that the sustaining of the demurrer means the end of the criminal action against him, and proof that there are no facts in his transactions with the Bank of Jacksonville that warrant the returning of indictments against him.

On Wednesday Greer was sentenced to serve three months in jail, and according to Portland papers he presented the federal authorities with a list of the people to whom he sold his moonshine. Greer pleaded necessity, stating his family had to be supported and that he made the whiskey to earn a living, but the plea had no effect on U. S. Judge Bean, who sentenced him.

MEDFORD TOSSERS DEFEAT HILL BY SCORE 15 TO 13

"Some scrap!" is the way several hundred people passed on the basketball game at the Natatorium last night in which the Medford high tossers triumphed over the Hill's Military academy quintet by the close score of 15 to 13. It was a torrid affair from the initial whistle to the closing gun and Klum's men had all they could do to maintain their advantage, established early in the first period.

True to expectation the Portland men showed cleverer form on Medford's larger floor than they had on the previous evening at Ashland and gave the Red and Black squad a hard run. Medford's five, however, was more than equal to its task and its performance was of the best, the entire squad playing together as a machine with no sign of individual stalling or fancy line-light stuff. Hill's passing was noticeably weak, while the local high school's defense was not up to past performances. Both teams were evenly matched, comparatively speaking, it was a toss between the two and the speed of the local hoopers was responsible for their edge over the academy team. The playing of Captain Goodrich of Hill's Academy is worthy of mention, since the clever work of this running guard was of the best class. Hoptley also played well.

Last night's game is generally considered one of the fastest and hardest ever staged on the Natatorium floor, and when the Hill quintet clashes again tonight with Klum's five in an effort to redeem their laurels, there will undoubtedly be a large crowd on hand to witness the battle. The fair and impartial control of yesterday's game by referee Art McKenzie of O. A. C., won the approval of those who witnessed it and contributed to making last night's game interesting and fast.
