G. MEDFORD CLUB NOT TAKING SIDES IN BLAKELEY CASE

An article in Friday's paper headed "Medford Women Aid Mrs. Blakeley in Coming Trial" has in the opinion of certain members of the Greater Medford club created a wrong impression, in regard to its attitude toward Mrs. Blakeley. The heading was based upon the following statement in the article contributed by a member of the club: "The Greater Medford club voted to send three representative women to Jacksonville during the coming trial of Mrs. Blakeley thereby showing her she has the moral support of the women in her community during the trouble that confronts her."

It seems that some people reading the heading have secured the impression that the Greater Medford club is taking sides on the question, and is working in Mrs. Blakeley's behalf. Such of course is not the case, and no such conclusion is warranted by the text of the article.

Members of the club have requested this paper to state that only moral support is intended, the club feeling that as Mrs. Blakeley is a woman, the only woman involved in the Jacksonville case, it is only proper that a woman's organization should send representatives to the trial, and give such moral support as is consistent with an absolutely impartial view of the case from a legal or technical standpoint.

OREGON GROWERS SUPPORT LEGION'S ANTI-JAP STAND

Whereas it is reported that an attempt is being made to colonize the Rogue River valley with Japanese horticulturists and agriculturists forced to seek new fields of operations by reason of the recently enacted anti-alien land law of California, and

Whereas Japanese farmers have recently acquired leases on several orchard properties in the Rogue River valley and are now reported to be negotiating through certain agencies for other large holdings, and

Whereas the three hundred members of the Oregon Growers Co-operative association, Rogue River district, are in hearty sympathy with the efforts of the Medford Post, American Legion, to take such steps as may be deemed necessary and advisable to prevent the establishment of a Japanese colony in the Rogue River valley to the end that the citizenship of this district may be retained at its present level and

Whereas no Japanese farmers have been allowed to become members of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association, now therefore

It is resolved by the directors of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association for the Medford and Grants Pass districts that the board of directors of said association be and they are hereby notified that it is the unanimous and positive opinion of this body that the association immediately go on record against admitting any Japanese to membership in this association.

It is further resolved that we hereby call upon and request all other districts of the association to pass similar resolutions.

It is further resolved that all other organizations having to do with the marketing of fresh fruit in the Rogue River valley and all private fruit buyers and commission houses be and the same are hereby requested to express their views on this subject in communications addressed to the Medford post of the American Legion.

It is further resolved that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Medford post of the American Legion and our representatives in the Oregon legislature.
