A Chinese New Year celebration lasts for a week, and generally winds up with a lot of racket. During this period a good Chinaman is supposed to pay all his debts, and forgive all his enemies. The rain nuts, without which no Chinese New Year is a success, did not arrive in time for the opening event. Before the festive season is over, the Chinese of Yreka, Cal., and this city will have a sort of a get-together meeting.

BUTTE FALLS IS LEADING COUNTY IN RELIEF FUND

Butte Falls was the first rural district to report as having completed their campaign for the European Relief fund. The quota assigned to Butte Falls was \$50.00 and during the three-day campaign they raised \$44.75. During December there was sent from Butte Falls to state headquarters the sum of \$18.09 and there was a contribution of \$10 made during The Mail Tribune campaign, so that the district is credited with \$92.84. Butte Falls is to be congratulated on the showing made by exceeding her quota by nearly 100 per cent, and this was made possible through the able leadership of their chairman, Mrs. N. B. Stoddard. No other rural districts have reported.

FEAR VOLCANO IN THE KLAMATH F. DISTRICT

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 8.—Recent queer occurrences reported in the lava bed region in the northern part of Modoc county, California, have caused some inhabitants to fear that some long dormant volcano is about to break forth. The family of W. P. Heryford, it is reported, was awakened recently before midnight by queer rumbling noises. On rising and looking out, they said, they saw flames in the hills across the lake from their dwelling. The flames at intervals shot high into the air, the increase in volume being accompanied by the rumbling sounds. Other persons have reported similar sights and occurrences, but owing to the remoteness of the district, authentic information is difficult to obtain. The lava fields are north of Mount Lassen and northeast of Mount Shasta.
