# SHERIFF LOATH TO KILL DOGS LAW UNPOPULAR

The dog tax situation in Jackson county was further complicated this morning by the announcement from the county clerk's office that the sheriff balked on killing dogs, whose only crime was that their masters were too tight-fisted to pay the tax. Under the law, the sheriff is supposed to execute all canines without a license, but as it is against his scruples towards dumb brutes there is no recourse. According to the county figures, there are 1700 dogs in Jackson county and of this number about 500 masters have remitted, leaving 1200 untaxed and unlicensed. Most of the 500 within the law, came in with a rush when it was announced that there would be a massacre of canines unless the tax was paid. The county has about decided to let the matter drop, unless the sheriff has a change of heart. Most of the opposition to the dog tax comes from the county, though a few in the towns are not widely excited about it. The farmers argue that their dogs are as much of a necessity on the farm as a plow, driving the cows and chasing the pigs out of the garden. They maintain that the burden of the dog tax should fall on the city dog, that does nothing but chase cats and ride on the running boards of Fords, and bark at the moon. A large number of farmers all over the state snipped their foot down with a bang at the dog tax from the start. In connection with the present situation locally, the legislature at Salem threatens to take some action towards the repeal or modification of the law before the close of the session.
