IRISH TIRED OF SQUABBLING, WANT ANY SETTLEMENT

DUBLIN—There is a great weight of general sentiment throughout the country in favor of any settlement, which will end the present, chaotic, Irish Catholic bishops are foremost among those who are encouraging this sentiment.

Between the most moderate and the most extreme nationalists, there is this one point of agreement, that the decision of the Irish people themselves must be supreme. Submission of their attitude to the electors and the endorsement of that attitude by the country's voters, is the basis on which Sinn Feiners rest their case.

There is a considerable section of the populace, however, who believe the time has arrived for a fresh consultation of the people—that a new opportunity should be given for expression of the popular will. The suggestion is made that a formal referendum should be taken as to whether the people still adhere to the uncompromising republican policy, or are willing to give the new home rule act a trial.

Sir Edward Carson, for Ulster, has accepted, but Sinn Fein has refused the act. In neither case have the people themselves been consulted as to what they think of it.

There is even among Sinn Feiners a number who believe that it would be good tactics to accept the act as far as it goes, secure the election of Sinn Feiners to the southern parliament and obtain as much control of the Irish government as possible in the same way as they have obtained control of most of the local authorities.

The argument is heard that de Valera and Arthur Griffith could do more for the cause in executive office than in jail, but that is not the dominant Sinn Fein view—at any rate among the "responsible" leaders of the movement. Hence the suggestion to consult the rank and file.

STATE MOTOR ASSO. OPENS BRANCH IN CITY TOMORROW

To the People of Rogue River Valley: The Oregon State Motor association will celebrate Lincoln's birthday tomorrow, by opening a branch office in Medford, for the purpose of stimulating tourist travel, agitating the construction and maintenance of good roads, and maintaining a bureau of road information.

This is the Oregon branch of the American Automobile association and connects up with that institution throughout California, where it is a habit with travelers to apply for information and advice, as to where to go and what to do when they get there.

It is generally conceded that 1921 will exceed any previous year in the number of automobilists traveling over the Pacific coast, and with a systematic connection with the American Automobile association in California, Medford's camp ground and that of Ashland, will be crowded to capacity.

Many of the tourists are looking for homes in the west and a pleasant greeting at every turn will do much to keep them in your community. Be not only courteous to them, but concerned in their welfare. Not officious, but carefully attentive.

Here is a thought that I believe can be worked to the advantage of the community: It is important that the traveling world know you have an office of the three AAA's in your midst, so why not add it to your letter heads? Official headquarters in southern Oregon for the Oregon State Motor association, or words that effect will cost you nothing and will help your town.

I have done all I can to get this office for Medford, but unless it is locally supported it cannot succeed. We are now getting out maps and other printed matter, that will be available in the Medford office as well as those of California, in time for the season of 1921. CAESAR SECOND TO ZANE GREY IN U. S. ARMY

COBLENZ.—Tales of adventure in the American west are the favorite reading matter of the American forces in Germany and Zane Grey is the most popular author.

Strangely enough Julius Caesar runs a close second with the doughboys, who are very keen about translations of Caesar's Gallic wars. This is due to Caesar's activities in the Rhine valley, and the ruins of a bridge he built across the Rhine, which lifts Caesar's work out of the school book class and makes it a guidebook that carries the Americans back nearly 2000 years.

Books which describe the legends centering about the Rhine are also popular, especially with the soldiers who are musically inclined and attend the Wagnerian performances given by the various German grand opera companies which play in Cologne, Coblenz, Wiesbaden and the other cities near the Rhine frequented by soldiers on leave.

All-story magazines which specialize in adventures are more popular with the American soldiers than any other periodicals and the American Library association has been unable to supply the demand for publications of this sort.

With the assistance of the Young Men's Christian association, which aids in the distribution of reading material in the American area, Miss Ala Weyth, who is in charge of the American Library association's reading rooms, has been able to make a general poll of the reading taste of the army and finds that foreign residence has not won the young Americans away from fiction laid in America, particularly in the west.

A new act regulating the sale and inspection of commercial feeding stuffs has gone into effect in Canada. Under the act bran, shorts and middlings must be free from screenings and the analysis must correspond to a prescribed standard.

The Armour company, one of the members of the "Big Five" group of meat packers has announced that its 1920 sales totaled \$900,000,000 and that the net profit was within a few dollars of \$5,320,000.

Rinderpest, a cattle plague, is destroying great numbers of cattle in Europe. The disease has never been known in this country.

ASHLAND 1ST. NOW HAS FULL WAR EQUIPMENT

ASHLAND, Feb. 11.—"Sleeping" on their arms" is more than a theoretical allusion as applied to First Company, the local military contingent, inasmuch as the command is now well equipped, and the personnel vigilant and on the alert, in readiness for any emergency. The "First" now has a complete field equipment, including machine guns, ranges, packs and blankets, in addition to all other regulation outfits and kits. An investment of \$20,000 represents the government property which is already housed in the Ashland armory, and the equipment is being constantly increased.

The armory is already the headquarters of an athletic club as well as military headquarters. Shower baths are available, while the billiard and pool tables are well patronized. A recent addition is a boxing and wrestling mat of ample proportions, just the thing needed to develop the many arts of boxing and wrestling, several experts along these lines being in company ranks. A new gallery practice room is about completed.

Intellectually the welfare of the men is not being overlooked, the privileges of a reading room being available. Lately a talk on "Security" was given by Sgt. Weran, outlining with opportune illustrations the advantages of safety first precautions. Sergt. Chas. Robertson succeeds to the title of "building superintendent," with permanent offices in the front of the armory.

A grand opening reception event is planned by the military boys in the near future, at which citizens in general are to be invited. Townspeople are also welcome to attend exhibitions of drill routine on Monday evenings of each week. With the installation of a new armory at Medford, opportunities will be extended for the military units of both towns to get together in friendly rivalry over both athletic and routine tactical development.

SOON BE BORING FOR CLARET ON THE BRONX

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—Exploration of passages in a wine cellar on the upper east side, where police have found 650 barrels containing 33,800 gallons of California claret, was begun today.
