

# COLBY REFUSES TO SHOW TREATY TO SENATE COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Secretary Colby has refused to transmit to the senate foreign relations committee information regarding negotiations with Japan looking to the framing of a new treaty to meet the situation created by the adoption of the California anti-alien law.

Replying to a letter from Chairman Lodge asking for the report of Ambassador Morris on his negotiations with Baron Shidehara, the Japanese ambassador, the secretary said there was considerable misunderstanding as to the exact status of the matters under discussion and at this time, it was impossible for the state department to submit the documents requested.

Mr. Colby's letter to Senator Lodge follows:

"I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of yesterday's date, requesting, if not incompatible with the public interest, that I furnish the committee with a copy of the agreement reached between the Japanese ambassador and Mr. Morris. Permit me to say that this request indicates a misapprehension of the status of the four pariers which have been going on for some time past with a view to reaching a friendly understanding as to the scope and terms of a conventional agreement yet to be negotiated by the plenipotentiaries of Japan and the United States when they shall have been duly empowered to that end. While I think I am warranted in saying that substantial progress has been made toward an ultimate agreement, there is no agreed text of which a copy could be communicated to the committee in advance of the regular submission of whatever convention may be ultimately signed."

# CREATE A NEW U. S. CARDINAL

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 11.—The Associated Press dispatches from Rome stating that Archbishop Dennis J. Dougherty of Philadelphia, would be raised to the cardinalate were confirmed today. The archbishop will leave for Rome within ten days, the exact date depending upon steamer accommodations.

Archbishop Dougherty, while receiving the congratulations of close friends and church men who know of the distinguished honor about to be conferred upon him, excused himself from public comment at this time.

# HOLD UP SCHOOL ROOF 75 CHILDREN SAVED

AUGUSTA, Ga., Feb. 11.—Heroic devotion of three women school teachers is reported here today to have saved the lives of school children during the tornado which partially wrecked Oconee, Georgia yesterday. One end of a school building crumpled under the drive of the wind and the roof sagged down over the heads of 75 pupils. The teachers held it up until their charges escaped through the very door leaped to safety themselves.

# MINE CONVENTION OPENS PORTLAND ON APRIL FIFTH

PORTLAND, Feb. 11.—(Special.) Portland is preparing to host to the third annual international mining convention to be held here April 5-9. Fifteen hundred delegates, executive of their families, will attend and will represent a territory covering Alaska, British Columbia, and the states of Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California and Nevada. Everything pertaining to mines and mining will be discussed, and every mechanical equipment used in mining and every ore and mineral taken from the earth in the territory embraced will be exhibited.

The delegates and their families will be the special guests of business men and social leaders of Portland, and every attention will be given to their comfort and entertainment. A special committee comprised of the city's most prominent women has been appointed to look after the wives of the delegates. Banquets, dances and automobile rides to scenic spots will be liberally sprinkled through the five days' session.

Among the distinguished men who have been invited to address the convention on subjects pertaining to mines and mining are: Herbert Hoover, Governor Riggs of Alaska, the Honorable William Sloan, minister of mines for British Columbia; Edwin Ludlow of New York, who succeeds Mr. Hoover as president of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers; and W. J. Loring, of Los Angeles, president of the American Mining Congress.

# MARRIED 7 TIMES 2 WIVES AT ONCE

ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 11.—"Uncle" Newt Lintner, 80, told Judge Hatchcock that with all his seven marriages, he had never intentionally had more than one wife at a time. An erroneous report that number six was dead caused him to marry number seven, the aged negro said, and the court was impressed to the extent of reducing bail from \$300 to \$200 and "Uncle" Newt got back to his peddling business, his seventeen children, and his record as veteran fighter of the confederate army.

# WOULD KEEP LITTLE EVA FROM THE STAGE

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 11.—The Wisconsin legislature was asked this morning to pass a law, forbidding girls under 16 years of age from playing the part of little Eva in Uncle Tom's Cabin by members of the Methodist church of Palmyra, Wis. The petitioners said the effect of so young a person in the play had an unwholesome effect upon the audience and that the effect upon the youthful actress likewise was not for the best interest of the child.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Collection of income taxes on profits realized from the sale of capital assets, will continue, Internal Revenue Commissioner Williams announced today, until the constitutionality of that provision of the law has been determined by the supreme court, notwithstanding the recent decision to the contrary by a Connecticut court in what was known as the Brewster case.

# PROPOSES LAW TO PROTECT HUSBIES

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 11.—An equal rights bill with a reverse twist, designed to "protect" men was introduced in the Wisconsin legislature today. Assemblyman Sullivan proposes to amend the law to give husbands the same dower rights in their wives' estates as are now shared by widows in their husbands' property. He also provides that a married man or woman who has "wifely and without just cause" lived away from his or her mate for one year or more, loses all dower rights. Husbands would be entitled to a one-third dower in the property of their wives.

# TIE-UP AT PANAMA CANAL THREATENED

PANAMA, Feb. 11.—Operating mechanics employed on the Panama canal have resigned because of the withholding of bonus payments, and the situation threatens a tie-up of the canal by the time the Atlantic and Pacific fleets feature here from the joint maneuvers in progress on the west coast of South America.

# Grandad O'Brien a Wiz on the Ice

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—Stephen O'Brien, 66 years old, an amateur skating champion of more than forty years ago, wore another medal on his chest today as a result of a skating feat last night. He negotiated 12 miles on a twenty-lap to the mile track in 53 minutes, two minutes less than the record south. He sprinted the last two laps, gave an exhibition of fancy skating and then engaged in a strenuous game of ice hockey, substituting for one of his sons.

# FARM LOAN AID PASSES HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The appropriation bill for the purchase of \$100,000,000 of federal farm loan bonds to provide credits for farmers pending decision by the supreme court in the litigation testing constitutionality of the farm loan law, was adopted today by the senate. It now awaits approval by the house.

# MAY DRAIN LAKE MICHIGAN FRONT FOR SHIP SPACE

CHICAGO.—Reclamation of the foreshore on Lake Michigan in the Chicago district would provide nearly 100 square miles of land for wharves, warehouses and port facilities, according to a report submitted to city officials by Col. W. V. Judson, district war department engineer.

The report calls attention to the fact that ocean liners may dock at Chicago's wharves within the next fifteen years if the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence river channel project is carried out. Such an outlet to the Atlantic would connect Chicago with the sea routes of the world. The coal mines of southern Illinois and the cotton belt of the south will feel the touch of Chicago commercial endeavor through an eight-foot barge channel to the Mississippi. "Never before did it seem as fair to point out in prophecy a region where there must inevitably and soon be established the world's greatest port facilities," the report says.

"The foreshore of Lake Michigan fronting Chicago slopes very gently lakeward," the report continues, "so that the seven-fathom contour is four miles off shore. This means that in our submerged lands, all publicly owned, the Chicago district possesses nearly a hundred square miles any part of which it is within the power of man to raise into land. This is an asset of almost incalculable value."

Reviewing the sections of Chicago's lake front, Col. Judson points out that Lakes Wolf and George lie close to Lake Michigan on the Illinois-Indiana line with six square miles of marshy land adjacent. This section "offers the greatest opportunity in all this region for the creation of wharf facilities of a character, magnitude and location suited to the demands of the future," the report says.

General plans for these harbor facilities, Col. Judson said, have been approved by the war department, which is charged with studying harbor conditions under the Esch-Cummings law.
