115,163 PEOPLE FLY 3 MILLION MILES, NONE HURT

NEW YORK.—A total of 115,163 passengers flew 3,156,550 miles in commercial airplanes during the last twelve months without the loss of a single life, the Manufacturers Aircraft Association announced here today. These figures are based on the performance of 425 planes, and it is believed that the number of passengers and the mileage would be doubled if the figures of the 1000 commercial airplanes operating in this country were obtainable.

In the absence of any federal system of registration, air laws and government methods for tabulating the ownership and performance of aircraft, it has been found difficult to trace the total number, the association stated. The totals are based on questionnaires distributed by the association, but due to the itinerant nature of much of the flying, it has been difficult to trace and record more than half of these. This one half, by 87 companies or individuals, are permanently located in all parts of the United States.

Much of the mileage was made on short flights of 10 to 15 miles, for which an average fee of \$12.50 was charged. An increasing demand for aerial transportation between the cities has been noted, the average charge for this service being 65 cents a mile. On practically all inter-city flights baggage or freight was carried, the quantity limited only by the capacity of the craft. This business aggregated 41,390 pounds.

There were accidents and forced landings, but according to the signed reports from 87 companies, in the 3,156,550 miles flown not a single life was lost. There were 222 forced landings and 88 accidents. There have been fatal accidents in other instances, they occurred in the course of stunt or exhibition performances or under circumstances indicating that undue risk had been taken.

DUTCH PRINCESS ALLOWED TO SEE HER FIRST MOVIE

THE HAGUE.—The little Princess Juliana, only child of Queen Wilhelmina and Prince Consort Henry who may one day succeed to the throne of the Netherlands, has just been permitted to see her first moving picture show. She is 11 years old and is being reared in the sheltered fashion characteristic of the home life of Queen Wilhelmina.

The little princess, however, is being trained in music and other arts as well as in the duties of a housekeeper. Her first moving picture show was of the educational type, a South Pole picture. Queen Wilhelmina rarely appears at fetes, public receptions or patriotic celebrations. In fact, she is seldom seen in public except when walking through the woods or driving in one of her carriages or automobiles. She prefers dignity to display and her reticence could hardly be called prudish.

Supporters of the continuation of the present form of government in Holland, a constitutional monarchy, express few apprehensions over the possibility that this form might be changed even to that of a republic, which has been proposed in the event that the Princess Juliana should fail to give Holland a male heir to the throne.

Dutch officials say that the House of Orange is deeply rooted in the affections of the Dutch people and there are in the country millions who desire to adhere to the present form of government.

MEMBER FEDERAL FARM LOAN BOARD ENDORSES FARM BUREAU MOVEMENT

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 11.—Federal reserve paper with a nine months or twelve months period of maturity would greatly assist the farmer and overcome to a great extent the predicament of the tillers of the soil find themselves in at the present time, according to A. F. Lever, member of the Federal Farm Loan board who addressed the marketing conference here recently.

The question appermost in the minds of farmers is what happened to bring about the present situation, said Mr. Lever. "What has occurred to justify a slump in prices of farm products ranging from 50 to 100 per cent within a period of 12 months?"

Certainly there are no less months to be fed now. The yield for 1920 was not unusually large. The starving children of Armenia need your wheat and corn and livestock, but they have nothing with which to pay for it. The domestic consumer of farm products is on a buyers' strike. He is refusing to buy at the exorbitant prices demanded by some retailers, except as he must buy to meet immediate needs.

The domestic manufacturer, the wholesaler and the jobber, because of the uncertainty of the price of the raw material and the demand for finished product, are, as it were, dancing the hesitation, and they too are in the market only to fill immediate demands.

The underlying cause has been that a farmer has been taught to walk the furrow and produce and per capita he is the best producer in the world. We have taught him to become an expert with his hands and have left him as a child in the use of his head in the management of his affairs, other than production.

For the great staple crops like wheat, corn, cotton, wool and livestock there is no existing machinery for the orderly marketing of farm products. Agriculture is both under-capitalized and is without any adequate system of credits adapted to its peculiar needs.

There is a terrific strain upon the finances of the country at the crop moving season. Also an inefficient and expensive system of transportation. There is an uneconomic and unwise strain upon the buying and absorptive powers of the purchasers of farm products. Under this system we are asking the buyers of farm products to meet their needs for a period of twelve months in a period from four to five months, with the inevitable result to the seller of these products.

The remedies which suggest themselves to me are: The elimination of all unnecessary factors in the present system of distribution. The organization of commodity sales agencies. The standardization of farm products into

grades and classes. The warehousing of sufficient quantities of products to set up an even flow of such products into the markets of the world as the immediate demands of the world call for them. The devising of such credit machinery as will enable the farmer to market his products in a sane and orderly way.

The banker thinks in the psychology of a quickly maturing paper. The turn over of the capital investment of the farmer is once in 365 days. A paper, therefore, with a maturity of only sixty or ninety days, certainly, in times of financial stress when money is hard to get, is of little value to him. If we are to solve his credit problem, we must provide him, with a paper which has a maturity period equal to the turn over period of his investment, and a paper of less time than one or twelve months' maturity, better fifteen months, can not be of the greatest value to him.

To my mind a system can be devised which will meet this necessity. This is predicated upon the pooling of the assets of the concern and the issuance against such pooled assets certificates of indebtedness or debentures in varying denominations and periods of maturity. What is a government bond? A government bond is the evidence of the fact that congress under the constitution has the power to tax all of the assets of all the people to make good the face of the bond.

A piece of farm land in itself, no matter how valuable, will fail to unlock the doors of credit. A farm mortgage on the same piece of land in itself would have no standing in the money markets of the world, but when under the farm loan act we have set up four thousand associations of farmers thru every agricultural county in the United States, and when these associations have taken in many farm mortgages—in the neighborhood of 135,000—and have placed these in Federal Land banks—regional banks—in the hands of a government appointee known as farm loan registrar, and these banks have issued against this mortgage farm loan bonds, the Missouri farm has become through this magic a liquid asset which flows freely in the money markets of the country. What is a farm loan bond? It is the evidence that a trustee has in his possession farm mortgages which if foreclosed would be sufficient in value to meet the obligations of the bond.

The working out of this system of farm credit, as well as the solution of all the other problems of agriculture, depends upon organization of the farmers themselves under sane, conservative, fundamentally sound leadership. With it there can be but success. Without this, all these efforts will fail.
