

### LOCAL COMPANY D MAKES EXCELLENT SHOWING IN DRILL

Last Wednesday evening was held the annual Federal inspection of Company D, 5th Infantry Oregon National Guard of Medford, Oregon. The company was inspected by Col. W. A. Mages of the 59th United States Infantry now stationed at Camp Lewis. They were inspected with field packs and equipment and the inspection took place at the headquarters in the Natatorium at 8:30.

This is the inspection ordered by the war department each year and the result of which will determine the standing of the different companies by the war department. The local company made a most excellent showing at this inspection and Colonel Mages stated before leaving Medford that he was very much pleased with the showing made by Company D of Medford and complimented the company highly. The colonel has been in the service for years and has inspected many companies of National Guard troops and he stated that he had never inspected a National Guard company where the rifles and equipment were better cared for and kept than was the equipment of the local company. He stated the company had made a marked advancement in all lines of military instruction since the last annual inspection of February 17, 1920.

Col. Mages also expressed his pleasure in having been able to come to Medford and meet the people and see the city and stated that he had enjoyed himself and was also very much pleased to be able to meet many of the business men at the forum lunch at the Medford Hotel Wednesday noon and said if possible when he passes this way in March he will try to again stop off at Medford.

The people of Medford are all glad of the showing made by the Medford company at inspection and pleased with the work and progress the boys are making and hope that at the annual encampment at Camp Lewis this coming summer they may be able again to carry off the prizes if any are given at this annual affair.

### KANSAS TO GIVE CORN TO CHINA FAMINE VICTIMS

TOPEKA, Kas.—The story told in the brief cablegram received here by Dr. Charles M. Sheldon, editor of the Christian Herald, from Charles R. Crane, American ambassador in Peking stating 10,000 people in northern China are dying daily from famine, has lent impetus to the movement inaugurated in Kansas to contribute corn for these starving people.

"Twenty carloads of corn already have been contributed," said Dr. Sheldon, whose home is in Topeka. "We expect to send at least a hundred carloads of corn from Kansas. It will be shipped from Tacoma. I am advised by grain men that thoroughly dried corn can be shipped without danger of deterioration. We find that the appeal for corn meets with approval among farmers who are long on corn and possibly short on ready money just at this time."

The appeal for corn was sent out in cooperation with J. C. Mohler, secretary of the state board of agriculture. Dr. Sheldon is one of the American committee of 130 which has undertaken to raise \$8,000,000 for Chinese relief.
