

ASST. DIST. ATTY. QUILTS, ACCOUNT BRADY RETRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12.—Assistant District Attorney Henry Heidelberg resigned today after he had told District Attorney Brady that he would have to substantiate certain affidavits favorable to Thomas Brady, convicted of an attack upon Miss Jean Stanley.

The affidavits were presented yesterday with an application for a new trial for Brady.

According to Heidelberg today, Miss Stanley expressed sympathy for Brady and gratification that he had not been convicted on his first two trials.

"If she were brought face to face with the she would not be able to deny her statements," he said.

Miss Stanley and Miss Jessie Montgomery, her companion, were strong in their defense of Brady that Heidelberg said he had been prompted to go into court and make public their conversations.

Heidelberg said he had conferred with District Attorney Brady as to what course he should take and had been told that she should not claim exemption because he was in the attorney's office.

Heidelberg added that he felt he should resign before making a statement.

Affidavits which Heidelberg's statement substantiates, said among other things, that Miss Stanley had declared:

"I could be sent to the penitentiary for the things I said on the stand."

CUBA TO CONTROL SALES OF SUGAR

HAVANA, Feb. 12.—Control of the sale and shipment of Cuba's 1920-1921 sugar crop has been placed in the hands of a governmental organization known as the sugar finance commission. This commission, appointed yesterday, by President Menocal, consists of seven members who will receive no compensation.

The decree appointing the commission directs sugar buyers or sellers to file before February 20 sworn statements covering all foreign sales contracts. The agreements must stipulate that the product they cover is to be refined or used by the buyer, and not sold or offered for sale as crude sugar. Infractions of rules will result in refusal to issue permits for further shipments.

PORTLAND SHADOW IN PHILADELPHIA?

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 12.—Detectives early today inadvertently spoiled the capture of a man alleged to have attempted to extort money from E. T. Stotesbury, widely known banker and member of J. P. Morgan and company, New York, on a threat of harm to him and his family.

A letter had been sent to Mr. Stotesbury instructing him to place a sum of money in a black box at the entrance of a certain church. Detectives carried out the instructions and arrested a workman who picked up the box. He proved his innocence.

Detectives said a number of people socially prominent have received similar letters.

N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Trading in the stock market this week dwindled to slender dimensions, the turnover for the five full sessions being the lowest of any corresponding period for almost half a year. Movements were of a piece with these stagnant conditions, only a few speculative favorites recording more than nominal changes. Investment rails were almost entirely neglected but developed moderate heaviness later on the refusal of the United States railway labor board to reduce wages. Similar conditions prevailed in the bond market, many old issues, or new issues cancelling much if not all of their recent gains, while most of the new underwritings fell below their subscription prices.

Surface-wise the money market was in sympathy, but the money tone remained firm. Foreign exchange was again subjected to the bewildering cross-currents resulting from latest aspects of the German indemnity agreement.

Railroad returns and the tonnage and financial statements of companies engaged in important lines of manufacture show business is reviving slowly and unevenly. These conditions were exemplified in the smaller earnings of transportation systems and reduced bookings of the United States Steel corporation.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Secretary Daniels cabled today to Admiral Strauss, commanding the Asiatic fleet, to investigate reports that five American sailors had been fired upon in Vladivostok, presumably by revolutionary officers and one of them wounded.

HARDING SPEECH MAY BE HEARD ALL OVER U. S. A.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—President-elect Harding's address may be heard from Washington through the wonders of wireless.

Mr. Harding is considering a plan to have the address recorded on talking machines records and then transmitted by radio phone from the naval wireless station here on the night of March 4.

Thousands of wireless amateurs, it is said, are equipped to receive it, and it is being proposed that such amateurs organize parties for hearing the address.

Amateurs all over the east are already bombarding the president-elect with wireless calls to agree to the plan.

BISHOP FARRELLY PASSES AWAY

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 12.—The Right Rev. John P. Farrelly, Catholic bishop of the diocese of Cleveland, Ohio, died here this afternoon.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 12.—Hope for Bishop John P. Farrelly, head of the Catholic diocese of Cleveland, was abandoned today by his physicians, the bishop has been ill with pneumonia since last Sunday. Yesterday he suffered a collapse of the heart.
