LOCAL BANK IS FLOODED WITH BOOTLEG HOOCH

When fluid began to drop from the ceiling in the Medford National bank office this forenoon, which had an unmistakable boozy odor, there was great excitement, especially as for several minutes before the dripping was noticed there was a strong alcoholic smell in the bank, which made officers, clerks and patrons sniff and look suspiciously at each other.

SPANISH WOMEN CARRY BOMBS IN THEIR HAND BAGS

LISBON.—Two women who left a handbag containing six dynamite bombs in the office of the royalist newspaper Monarchia just before that office was raided by the police the other day have been arrested.

It is learned that the police raid was made because they had discovered the delivery of the bombs but the editor of the newspaper asserts that the women who brought the bombs to the office in his absence were absolutely unknown to him.

The police followed her to the newspaper office, found the bombs, closed and sealed the office and made several arrests.

Lieutenant Chaves could not be found. The hundreds of royalists who are loyal to the former King Manuel and who have been in prison for more than two years since the last royalist rising are in despair over this affair, which they believe will postpone indefinitely the amnesty to political prisoners, which they have long been promised.

For several nights following the raid on the Monarchia, sanguinary conflicts took place in some of the principal Lisbon cafes between bands of armed defenders of the Portuguese republic and people suspected of being members of the Integralista faction of royalists.

SPARKS FROM TODAY'S WIRE PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 16.—Portland's 1921 Rose Festival has been set for June 8, 9 and 10, the Rose Festival auxiliary announced today. It added that plans are being laid to make this festival the biggest ever held in Portland.

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—Charles Heddon of Dowagiac, Michigan, today is the champion national amateur 18.2 ball line billiard player. He won the title last night when he defeated Percy Collins of Chicago, 300 to 247 in the closing game of the tournament.

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 16.—A bachelor's tax was proposed in a resolution introduced in the Wisconsin legislature today. If passed it would require unmarried men between the ages of 31 and 35 years to pay an annual tax of \$10 to the school funds. Men who have divorced their wives or whose wives have died within two years would be exempt.

IRISH RADICALS CONDEMN PRISON CAMP TREATMENT

DUBLIN.—Severe criticism of the treatment of prisoners confined at the Ballykinlar internment camp on Duncrum Bay, county Down, is published by the Irish Bulletin, a Sinn Fein publication. It is asserted that Sir Hamar Greenwood's statement in the House of Commons that the interned men would be accorded treatment similar to that normally given prisoners of war is far from correct.

"The prisoners are given, wholly insufficient food and many of them go hungry," the paper declares. "Even this food they are unable to make the most of, as they do all their own cooking and are allowed less than half the supply of coal necessary."

There is no hot water in the camp, no wash house and no drying room, the article continues, and it is therefore necessary for the prisoners to do their washing as best they can in cold water and dry their laundry wherever they can.

"Many of the prisoners," the statement goes on, "are practically barefooted," saying that no arrangements have been made for supplying them with boots or even for repairing those they have.

It is charged that, while the prisoners are permitted to receive parcels, "almost invariably part of the contents is pilfered by the English troops in the camp." The prisoners suffer intensely from cold and underfeeding, it is stated.

"Every batch of prisoners who have arrived at the camp during the last month," the article goes on, "have complained of their treatment en route. One batch of 26 men left a certain camp near Dublin on Sunday evening and did not arrive in Ballykinlar until Tuesday evening. During this time they received practically no food, the military guard having forgotten the prisoners' rations."

RACE TRACK BILL ALLOWING BETS PASSES OLYMPIA

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 16.—The Flockwell bill establishing a state racing commission and permitting the use of pari-mutuel betting machines, passed the state senate today after a clause referring it to a vote of the people had been inserted as an amendment. The bill, now goes to the house. Previously the senate had defeated the bill but later reconsidered its action.

The senate also passed the Davis bill, providing for a 15-day period between applications for marriage licenses and issuance of the licenses, which had previously been passed and reconsidered.

An amendment provides that in exceptional cases, superior court judges may authorize immediate issuance of licenses before expiration of the 15-day period.

A senate joint memorial petitioning congress to release cargo, agate on government ships leaving Washington state ports for free transportation of grain and cereals to famine districts of China passed the senate under suspension of the rules.

HOOVER MENTIONED AS POSSIBILITY IN HARDING'S CABINET

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Feb. 16.—As President-elect Harding continued his conference with leaders of his party today, it was indicated that completion of the cabinet slate of the coming administration waited only on definite selections for the portfolios of navy, commerce and labor. To fill these places, however, it was said some shifting of assignments, already more or less definitely fixed, might be necessary.

As the list stood today, with navy, commerce and labor vacant, it was understood to contemplate the appointment of Charles Evans Hughes of New York, for secretary of state; John W. Weeks of Massachusetts for secretary of war; Andrew Mellon of Pennsylvania for secretary of the treasury; Will H. Hays, Indiana, for postmaster general; Harry M. Dwyer of Pennsylvania and a number of others are being urged for secretary of labor.

This morning Mr. Harding again talked over the problem with Mr. Hays and later he expected to begin conferences on the subject with Mr. Daugherty.

Mr. Hughes, Mr. Mellon and several others high in party councils are expected here before the end of the week.

GREAT BRITAIN NEAR U. S. A. IN SHIP BUILDING

LONDON, Feb. 16.—All records for the construction of merchant vessels were broken by the yards of Great Britain during 1920 when 618 vessels, of 2,955,624 tons were completed. The total of 1919 was exceeded by 435,182 tons and the previous record figures of 1913 by 142,371 tons, says Lloyds register.

On the other hand the figures given on the 1920 output of United States yards—509 vessels of 2,476,253 tons—show a decrease of 1,599,132 tons compared with 1919, this decrease accounting for over 92 per cent of the total reduction in tonnage launched abroad during 1920.

The world's output for 1920 was 1759 vessels of 5,861,666 tons against 2,483 vessels of 7,144,549 tons in 1919 and 1750 vessels of 3,332,882 tons in 1913.

A feature was the launching of 1,825,000 tons of vessels to be fitted with steam turbines, these figures representing one-third of the total world's output of steam tonnage.

The tonnage launched by Japan, Norway and Sweden during 1920 also shows a decrease but the output of other countries increased.

DUKE CLAIMS THAT LABOR TAX IDEA IS LEGAL ROBBERY

LONDON.—The Duke of Northumberland, who owns many thousands of acres of land and several manoriums, predicts hard times ahead for landlords if ever the labor party gets a chance to govern the country. Addressing the other day a meeting to inaugurate a branch of the Central Land Owners' association, he said:

"In order to deal with the present financial emergency, the policy of the leaders of the labor party is to impose very much higher death duties and super-taxes, to render it impossible for anybody to keep land at all. It is a policy of confiscation without compensation.

"The most moderate labor leaders contemplate a policy which differs from the soviet government of Russia only in this respect that the soviet government eliminates the possessing classes by organized massacre, while the labor leaders in this country would do it with legalized robbery. We are informed that the labor party, having dispossessed the landowners, will continue to feed and clothe them if they work and for this small mercy I suppose we must be thankful."

NAT'L CONVENTION OF WOMANS PARTY OPENS WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The National Convention of the woman's party, called to adopt a program for obtaining national and state legislation relating to women, got down to work today, receiving reports from various committees. These were considered at the opening session and are to be followed tonight by addresses of representatives of women's organizations of foreign countries.

Mrs. Velma Swanson Howard of Sweden, is to describe the operations of Sweden's new marriage law, providing for equal rights of married women with their husbands in the control of their children, and Madame Riviere will describe the efforts of French women to obtain suffrage.

Other speakers will be Princess Anne Assefarian of Roumania and Madame De Veyra of the Philippines. Mrs. Bainbridge Colby, wife of the secretary of state, will welcome the foreign delegates.

Representatives of all political parties will be heard by the convention tomorrow, on the legislation which they propose in the interest of women. On tomorrow's program also are speakers from various women's organizations, who will tell what those organizations are doing. The speakers will include Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter of the president, Miss Julia Lathrop, chief of the federal children's bureau; Mrs. Florence Kelley, secretary of the National Consumer's league; Miss Lida Hafford, Washington director of the Federation of Women's clubs; Miss Ethel Smith, legislative secretary of the Women's Trade Union club, and Mrs. Ellis Yost, legislative chairman of the National W. C. T. U.

The last day of the convention, Friday, will be given over to business matters.
