

WAGE REDUCTION IN ENGLAND IS REGARDED SURE

LONDON—Labor correspondents of various London newspapers assert the cost of living has declined in Great Britain and that a reduction of wages is inevitable. They report decreases in wages already have occurred in cases where sliding scales of pay were based on the selling prices of the goods produced.

SOVIET PLOT TO OVERTHROW INDIA NOW CONFIRMED

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Armed invasion of the Pamir region of central Asia, on the thresholds of India and China, was begun by Russian bolshevik troops last October, it is indicated by a communique just issued by the India office. The communique gave the text of an "order of the day" sent out October 10 by the chief commissar on the Turkistan front, to a soviet division ordered into the Pamir. It stated the men should "make themselves at home" and carry on bolshevik propaganda with a view to influencing the people of India to revolt against the British.
