

CHAMPIONSHIP BASKET B. GAME AT NAT TONIGHT

In order to accommodate the business men of the city, Coach Klum this afternoon decided to postpone the calling of the basketball game till 9 o'clock.

Tonight the Medford high basketball quintet will clash again with the Roseburg squad on the Natatorium floor in what promises to be one of the hardest fought games of the Southern Oregon conference series. The scores of recent inter-conference games have been running so close and the contending teams seem to be so evenly matched that the interest in this season's series has been unparalleled by those of former years. The Ashland hoop-squad defeated the Orange and Black men in two games Thursday and last night, the score of the first being 18 to 17 and the latter 29 to 26, though local witnesses of the games maintain that the Granite City five was outplayed practically throughout both games by the Roseburg five, which was handicapped by Ashland's small floor.

However it is an undisputed fact that Roseburg has a formidable lineup and the result of tonight's battle will decide whether or not she will return to Roseburg with a victory to her credit. If Medford succeeds in winning tonight the fight for the southern Oregon title and the privilege of representing this section in the Salem inter-scholastic tournament will be centered on Medford and Ashland and will be decided by the Medford-Ashland series next week.

Realizing the importance of tonight's fight the Red and Black five may be depended upon to put up a stiff scrap and Medford supporters are strong in the belief that the M. H. S. men will win this evening although they will have to go some to do it. As a preliminary the Medford high girls team will mix with the Roseburg sextet for the third game of the Medford-Roseburg girls series.

LONE MAN ROBS N. COAST LIMITED. 2 SUSPECTS TAKEN

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 19.—Only one man executed the hold-up last night of three clerks in a mail car of the North Coast limited, having boarded the train at Saint Cloud, Minn. He produced a pass, supposedly forged, and after talking with the clerks, ordered one of them to bind the others. C. E. Strong resisted and was shot and seriously wounded. The bandit emptied the contents of a registered mail sack into a grip and dropped off the train. Unofficially, it was estimated the loot amounted to several hundreds of thousands of dollars.

LITTLE FALLS, Minn., Feb. 19.—Two suspects were arrested here early today following a gun battle with officers and are being held in the county jail here in connection with the hold-up of a mail car on train No. 2 of the Northern Pacific railroad last night.

The men gave the names of Buck Allen and Bob Ford, both of Minneapolis. Deputy Sheriff Hub Freisinger was shot in the left hand and Ford in the arm. Sheriff Felix of Morrison county was notified that a car going at high speed was headed for Little Falls. He intercepted the suspects' machine and when they refused to stop opened fire, which was returned.

3 GENERALS OF FRANCE, GIVEN MARSHAL'S BATON

PARIS, Feb. 19.—The promotion of Generals Louis E. M. F. Franchet d'Esperey, Louis Hubert Gonzalve Lyautey and Marie Emile Fayolle to marshals of France, was announced today.

The promotion of Generals d'Esperey, Lyautey and Fayolle raises the number of marshals of France to six, the others being Joffre, Foch and Pétain.

General d'Esperey is former commander-in-chief of the allied forces in the Near East. In 1918 he brought Bulgaria to terms after a brilliant campaign.

General Lyautey, for several years governor of French Morocco, in 1916 entered the cabinet of Premier Briand as war minister, and later was reappointed resident general in Morocco.

General Fayolle who recently visited the United States, commanded the French army in the first battle of the Somme, playing a notable part in stopping the German rush in the spring of 1918, and later commanding the armies which advanced south of the Somme in the allied operations which checked the German July offensive. Shortly afterward he aided in delivering in this sector the blow which started the great German defeat.

General Fayolle commanded the American forces in their brilliant exploit at Cantigny, and had an important American contingent with him in the offensive of July 18, between Soissons and Chateau Thierry.

As told in a history of the English people, it is shown that it came about in the fourteenth century. In describing the Peasant's Revolt in 1377 to 1381, the history states:

"The lord of the manor, instead of cultivating the demesne through his own bailiff, often bound it more convenient and profitable to let the manor to a tenant at a given rate, payable either in money or in kind."

"It is this system of leasing, or rather to the usual term for the rent is entailed (feorm, from the latin, firma) that we owe the words farm and farmer, the growing use of which make the first step in the rural revolution which we are examining."

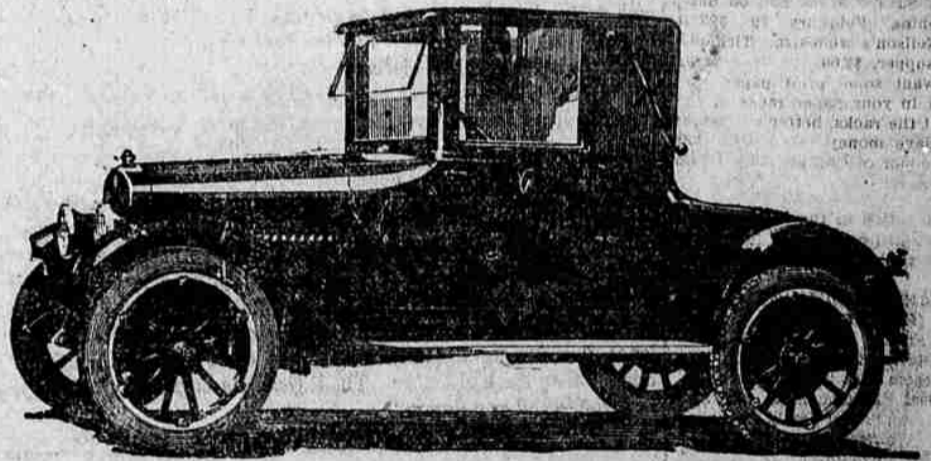

Has There Been Profiteering?

What Are the Facts?

During the war the general tendency, in the electrical

industry was to keep prices as nearly normal as possible. It was felt throughout the trade that this policy, while involving financial sacrifices, would ultimately prove beneficial, encouraging the uninterrupted increase in the use and appreciation of electrical household appliances. Results justified this attitude. An enormous increased demand, forcing increased production, led the way to more economical costs of production, enabling the electrical industry to keep prices nearer normal than many other industries. Prices on many electrical household appliances have advanced only a small percentage over pre-war prices.

Take, for example, the electric washing machine, one of the most useful labor-saving devices that can be employed in the home—the actual advance since 1914 has not been over 40 per cent, whereas many other commodities have advanced from 100 per cent to 500 per cent. In the case of the electric ironing machine, another big household help, the advance has been less than 40 per cent.

Radical Reductions Impossible

On account of such comparatively small increases as these in a large percentage of electrical household appliances, there is naturally a smaller percentage of reduction in the electrical industry than one would expect in other industries where the advanced in prices has been much greater. On the electrical household appliances, the increase has been the greatest, there have already been some reductions.

We can foresee no radical decrease in the cost of electrical household appliances.

come within the next six month or a year will be comparatively small in dollars and cents. The convenience and economy of having these utilities in your home will more than offset any reduction that is likely to be made.

Saving by Spending

As the original investment represented by the price you pay today for an electric washing or ironing machine will return to you 33 1-3 per cent in actual cash savings each year you use it (to say nothing of the convenience you will receive), it must be obvious to you that you are, in reality, saving money instead of spending it.

What You Lose by Waiting

Take an electric washing machine, for instance, now selling for \$150 to \$195. Suppose the price comes down \$10 or \$15 within the next twelve months. Having waited, you purchase a washer, figuring that you save \$15. Is that really a clear gain or not?

Household economists have proved that a good electric washing machine saves the user approximately \$60 a year on the ordinary laundry expense plus the wear and tear of clothes when subjected to the ruinous washboard.

Saving \$15 and Losing \$45

You would therefore be saving \$15 but losing \$45, and besides—you would have continued to bear the discomfort, the inconvenience, the hard labor and the waste of time that are all disagreeable features of washing in the old-fashioned way. While this illustration refers to electric washing machines, it applies with equal force to the electric ironer, the electric vacuum cleaner, and the other appliances that form such important features in the equipment of the modern home.

Electrical household appliances are being sold today at as low prices as present conditions permit. There have already been some small reductions on the lines where the percentage of increase has been the greatest. There will be other small reductions within the next year or two as fast as labor and material

conditions adjust themselves. But, Mrs. Housekeeper, is it not the part of wisdom to decide at once to avail yourself of the advantages you are offered in devices that lighten your burdens, add to the comfort and convenience of your home, and pay for themselves in the saving of time and expense?
