

REVIVAL SERVICES FIRST METHODIST DRAWING CROWDS

The interest in the Evangelistic campaign being conducted at the First Methodist Episcopal church has increased steadily through the week. Rev. J. A. Smith of San Francisco, who is assisting the pastor, is in great favor with the large numbers who have been hearing him. There were a score who responded to the appeal of the sermon last night, committing themselves publicly to the Christian life. Dr. Smith preached on "The Worldly-Wise Fool," and said in part: "To call a person a fool in a vindictive sense, is distinctly anti-Christian, but in relation to moral unwisdom and perversity the term, 'fool' expresses the very spirit of the Bible. The worldly-wise man, who forgot God was a fool for two reasons: First, because he tried to satisfy his immortal spirit on material things. He made ample provision for his body, but he let his soul starve. He erected new barns for his produce, but he built no shelter for his spirit. No man was allowed enough to swindle him out of the riches of Heaven. He was prompt in his engagements with bankers and brokers, but he failed utterly in his obligations to God. In the second place, this man was a fool because he presumed on the future. He said, 'Sail, thou hast much good laid up for many years,' but who gave him a lease on life? Even as he made his presumptuous boast, the voice of God broke in upon his pious meditations as a clear as a clarion, 'Thou fool, this night thy soul is required of thee.' The pastor, Rev. J. Randolph Sannett, said this morning that a great day has been planned for tomorrow, 'My only fear,' he said, 'is that we shall be unable to accommodate the crowd. People will certainly have to observe 'On Time Week,' if they expect to get seats."
